

# PAUL MEISTER, "UNDERWATER NATURALIST" TO PRESENT NOVEMBER PROGRAM

Paul Meister, an L.A. County instructor, an avid sport diver, and underwater naturalist will be sharing some interesting information with us and will tell us how we can all become underwater naturalists.

He has been diving the newly-named Issei Cove area at Whites Point on Palos Verdes Peninsula for 15 years.



During that time a study has been made by Paul and other sport divers whereby the have noted the seasonal changes underwater and behavioral patterns of marine life. A new program is being developed for sport divers to take part in studying underwater life and reporting their findings. This program is a joint effort among the Whites Point Shore Station divers, LA County Parks and Recreation Department, the LA Chapter of the Oceanic Society, and the GLACD (Greater Los Angles Council of Divers). The first step in this program will be to identify and report information on just one fish, the girabaldi, and just one plant a sea fern.

After Paul has explained this program to us at our November 1st meeting, you will have the opportunity to participate in the study by going on the November 6th beach dive at Issei Cove.

Paul also plans to give us an update on the progress of the underwater nature trail at Issei Cove and tell you how you can become part of the team which is working on the project.

# SAN NICOLAS ISLAND CLOSURE UPDATE

The SEA OTTER TRANSLOCATION is one year old. Sixty-nine otters have been translocated to San Nicolas Island with approximately twenty-one (21) currently still in the area. Of those translocated from their Central California Coastal Range, about nine (9) are known to have died from a variety of causes, stress, drownings in gill nets and lobster pots and one (1) by gun shot. Eight (8) are documented to have travelled back to their original site of capture along the Central Coast and the remaining otters are unaccounted for. Even one (1) which was tagged with a transmitting device is missing. Despite all the problems which have beset the Fish and Wildlife Service, they are still maintaining this program is a success and are entering their second year.

Recently the Navy has been enforcing a 300 yard clearance zone around SAN NICOLAS ISLAND. This is a regulation which has been on the books since 1965 but never enforced. THE FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE says the Navy has asked them to enforce this closure since the Fish and Wildlife has to monitor the island for otter surveillance anyway. But there are also reports from other well placed sources which say the Fish and Wildlife Service came to the Navy to request them to monitor the 300 yard closure. Intrigue has been the password for this program ever since it began back in the 70's.

Speaking to Bill Nott, PRESIDENT OF THE SPORTFISHING ASSOCIATION OF CALIFORNIA (SAC), this writer discussed the effect the closure had on his chartered fishing boats. After trying to go through channels to reason with the bureaucracies involved, Bill Nott decided the best approach was to go to the top of the Navy's chain of command. In so doing he sent a letter to the Secretary of the Navy explaining the closure and asking him to intercede. Now we, the diving community, must follow suit and request that the dive boats be allowed to re-enter the 300 yard closed zone. During the hearings divers had been advised that the Island would never be closed to recreational diving, but here we are now learning that they really don't mean what they were saying. During World War II security was a problem, but that was solved by working with the Navy. Similar restrictions exist at San Clemente, but the situation is workable. There is no reason a solution can't be found to keep San Nicolas Island open. WRITE A LETTER to — The Honorable Willam L. Ball III, Secretary of the Navy, Department of the Navy, The Pentagon, Washington, D.C. 20350. When writing, don't fight the battle of translocation over again, explain that this area is very important to recreational diving and with the coming of lobster season, it is the premier area for lobster diving. Mention that divers and dive boats do not disturb the otters and this area has been accessible for public use for decades. The aspect of being forced to dive outside the 300 yard

#### 1989 SCHEDULE

#### **CREW TIPPING**

Several members have requested guidance on crew tipping. Like any form of tipping it varies with the individual and the perceived service rendered. Assuming "all is well" with each crew member a good guide is \$5.00 per-day or \$1.00 per-day-per-crew-member.

#### DIVE BOAT ETIQUETTE AND SAFE DIVING PRACTICES

Below is a list of do's and don'ts on diving etiquette and safety. Although not necessarily all encompassing we belive it will help increase your and others enjoyment of boat diving.

## **DIVE BOAT ETIQUETTE AND SAFE DIVING PRACTICES**

#### DAN (SJOIDAN AD

- Mark all of your gear with at least your initials, tanks should have your full name. Keep as much of your unused or between dive gear neatly stowed or in your dive bag.
- ° Sign-in on the TRW Divemaster log and the boat log (when required).
- Do not leave personal gear in the galley.
- No wet items in the bunk areas.
- Dispose of all trash into the trash containers.

- Do not access crew areas, especially the bridge.
- On't use excessive amounts of fresh water, especially the hot water.
- Ouse only one bunk.
- Minimize noise if others are asleep, especially after 11:30 PM.
- ° Do not drop tanks, weight belts, etc. onto the deck or other boat equipment.
- ° Never leave your tank unattended, hold on to it or make sure it is secured with the bungie cord.
- ° Remove your B. C. and octopus from your tank for refills.
- ° If you are not diving don't crowd the deck area where divers are suiting up or preparing for a dive.
- Obey all game laws.
- Before leaving the boat at the end of the trip, fold your blankets, take all your gear, and settle any debts, with the boat or the club.

#### SAFE DIVING

- ° Plan your dive using the specific dive site information provided by crew divemaster(s). Do not "push the tables".
- ° Know your experience limits, if in doubt, discuss with the divemaster(s).
- Perform an on-deck equipment check with your buddy, and a further on-surface check after entering the water.
- ° Use the designated boat exit points. Move away from the boat exit once you are in the water.
- ° Always check in and out with the on-duty divemaster, and follow the gate and return to boat time limits.
- ° Fins should be put on last while you are waiting at the exit. Do not walk around the deck wearing fins.
- Our equipment to dive easily and safely. Do not over weight yourself. Only use your B.C. to fine tune your buoyancy during the dive or to compensate for a heavy game bag at the end of the dive.
- Loaded spearguns are NEVER allowed on the boat or boarding ramp. Bring a bag or container for your game.
- As a minimum use a compass, depth gauge and submersible pressure gauge. Plan your dive so you end the dive with a reserve of air and are able to return to the boat while still underwater, especially where kelp is thick.
- Be aware of current conditions and any changes during the dive. Use natural clues such as kelp. do not hesitate to pull yourself hand-over-hand back to the boat using the current line.
- Once back to the boat restow your gear, so as not to clutter the deck.
- Answer the role call only once and only for yourself.

PHOTOGRAPHERS, looky-loos, and bubble watchers will have plenty to see. 

#### DIANDEROXVER CON CONT

- A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club A club member will have a confirmed reservation on an upcoming dive only if:
  - A check in the full amount for the dive has been received by the dive boat reservationist, or
  - The club member has a deposit on file with the club and makes a telephone request for a reservation with the dive boat reservationist.
- Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible to provide paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive
- If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure any additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club.

  Only TRW club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive.
- Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
