

FROM THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE



As of 1 January 1990 we well be known as THE SEA DIVERS in lieu of the TRW SEA DIVERS. Our new structure is that of a private, non-profit organization furthering the sport of skin and SCUBA diving, continuing with the same charter and bylaws. In essence the change will be transparent to most club members and fairly insignificant. Our boat and beach dive schedule continue, the same style newsletter will be issued monthly, and for the time being (until full transition is accomplished) our Executive Committee will remain the same. Full elections will be held approximately March 1990 and will be open to all members for all positions.

As of the end of 1989 our membership was just over 180 and growing by about 5 members per month, with our makeup being 52% non-TRW and 48% TRW employees and associates. TRW SEA mandated that as of 1 January 1990 SEA club demographics must be no more than 25% non-TRW and 75% TRW employees and associates. In deference to our non-TRW members, we elected not to comply and hence the new status.

In the Executive Committee's assessment, the club is quite strong and should have no problem going it alone. Obviously we do need the full support of our present membership in order to be fully successful.

Our dues structure has changed only for TRW employees in that dues are now \$20 per year for all individuals and \$30 per year for all family memberships. A reduction in dues all around was not possible for 1990 as the cost of incorporation as a non-profit organization (for tax purposes) is approximately \$800. Dues will be re-reviewed for 1991. Prorating for new members will continue on a quarterly basis. By the way dues are due and payable for 1990 as of 1 January 1990 — please help by paying promptly.

A question and answer session on our new structure will be held at the 6 February 1990 General Meeting at Pancho & Wong's. Finally, I would like to thank those who supported our Executive Committee meeting at Baxter's on 14 December, where we discussed the many elements (pros and cons) associated with creating a private, non-profit organization. This has been a very tough decision with lots of hard work, but we believe it is the right thing to do and hope that the club members remain behind us and continue to fully support the club and its activities.

A WORD OR TWO ABOUT INSURANCE

There is considerable misconception regarding insurance and how it relates to THE SEA DIVERS, its members, and diving. MEDICAL INSURANCE is and always has been the responsibility of the individual diver. You should be sure that your personal medical insurance covers you for SCUBA diving, and that SCUBA is not excluded.

LIABILITY PROTECTION was provided (somewhat vaguely) by TRW Inc. for club officials only. As a private, non-profit organization, the club and club officials are protected by the signed individual waivers (as was TRW) and by demonstrating we are a properly organized and safely run club.

OTHER INSURANCE is carried by the individual boat owners/skippers, divemasters and other related elements of the dive community for their own protection.

We strongly recommend that all active divers avail themselves of the DAN insurance for Emergency Evacuation (unless covered by your present policy). Application forms are available through the Executive Committee and will be provided at the February General Meeting. Additional information can be obtained by calling DAN at 1-800-328-3323 and then pressing "1." NAUI and PADI also carry various forms of dive-related insurance, primarily for instructors and divemasters.

We will continue to strive to help with this much discussed and much misunderstood element of diving. Anyone who thinks they have all the answers should let us know — we'd sure like to talk!?

SAN JUAN ISLANDS DIVING

Whenever the San Juan Islands are mentioned in a group of divers, a typical question from those unfamiliar with the area is "Isn't that dry suit water?" Perhaps this is a natural assumption, as this beautiful archipelago lies between the southern end of Vancouver Island and the Washington mainland, a thousand miles to the north of our California dive sites. In fact it is not the case and this reasoning causes many divers to pass up perhaps one of the finest underwater experiences found anywhere.

The records of the Sea Wolf, a busy dive boat operating out of Anacortes, Washington, indicates that only about 35% of their clientele use dry suits. The water temperature remains at 50-52 °F year round, which is quite tolerable whin compared to the cooler waters of Port Hardy, the well known dive site at the north end of Vancouver Island. Diving in the San Juans is just as popular in the winter months as in the summer because of the constant temperature and the excellent visibility when the

plankton are less plentiful.

Divers are more concerned with staying warm between dives than with the water temperature. The Sea Wolf, for instance, has plenty of inside seating with the benefit of a good heating system and hot drinks for between dive warmups. Many wear coveralls over the wet suit between dives to protect themselves from the cool outside air and to keep the suit from drying out. The thinking is that salt crystals damage neoprene fabric. Saltwater can be rinsed away with warm fresh water aboard after all dives are completed.

Captain Jess and Sally Starnes, assisted by their son Allan, are the owners of the Sea Wolf and dthey run a first class diveboat operation. Sally prepares three gourmet meals a day that rival the finest restaurants, with snacks for quick energy between dives. Jess has experienced each of the areas where he puts his divers and is intimately familiar with the tidal currents and the sea life indigenous to each site. Due to the strong currents found in the islands, the Sea Wolf is operated as a "live" boat, in that it follows the bubbles and is a short distance

TENTH ANNUAL AVALON UNDERWATER CLEAN-UP 23-26 FEBRUARY 1990

This is an "option" day. At the present time, we are looking at chartering transportation to go to Little Harbor on the other side of the Island for a dive/picnic. Approximate cost for transportation (including gear) is \$28.00 per person. Picnic is included. Additional night's room is \$25.00 PER person (double occupancy) for the Sunday night stay.

This event is really a lot of fun for divers, non-divers and friends. The cost of the trip will be approximately \$110.00 per person (double occupancy) which includes round trip transportation on Catalina Cruises, two nights at the Bayview Hotel, the Sunday BBQ at the Bayview, registration, the awards dinner and a souvenir T-shirt. We have not dived CORTES BANKS since a two day affair in October of 1984. We planned a charter in early March 1989 but bad weather prevailed, so we'll try again. CORTES is a great LOBSTER area and the WILD WAVE is probably the only boat fast enough to make the banks for a single day from 22nd street.

CORTES BANKS is located about 80 miles S.S.W. of 22nd Street, about 40 miles S.W. of China Point on San Clemente Island and is almost directly and exposed dive spot the BANKS have not been dived as much as some of the closer in areas. Diving depths range from 20 to 80 feet providing generally excellent game taking possibilities. LOBSTER in particular have been abundant and the various reefs making up the banks are home to many species of good sized FISH. PHOTO and VIDEO buffs will not be disappointed.

This dive is generally considered an intermediate to advanced dive due to the BANKS

full exposure to the ocean. However, relative beginners can make the dives assuming that ocean conditions relative to wave action surge and/or current are within acceptable limits. The divemasters should be consulted on your dive plan and/or experience.

This is a great dive area and we anticipate the charter filling early. away to retrieve divers when they surface. They are extremely safety conscious and observe high standards in this regard.


The Starnes are just as concerned that their clients enjoy the beauty of the islands as well as have a fulfilling underwater experience. The San Juan islands have been described as a place where you can be in the mountains and at the ocean at the same time. The islands have abundant wildlife and are home to the bald eagle, deer and many other small animals. The surrounding water however, is a spectacular habitat for the worlds largest octopus, several families of Orca, giant kelp, the wolf eel and countless other species. Not only does everything seem bigger than in California, but more varied. The University of Washington established a marine laboratory on San Juan Island for students of marine biology because of the profusion of underwater life found there.

Cost for a three day dive cruise is \$210.00, with a maximum of 16 divers. Individual reservations are accepted or a club can get an exclusive advance booking for its members. A shuttle provides transportation between SEATAC and Anacortes three or four times a day.



DIVE BOAT POLICY

- A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club
 - - A check in the full amount for the dive has been received by the dive boat reservationist, or The club member has a deposit on file with the club and makes a telephone request for a reservation with the dive boat reservationist.
 - For TWO DAY DIVES, a minimum of one half of the price of the dive must be recieved by the dive boat reservationist. Dive Boat deposits may be used as a part of the one half requirement.
- Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver 3) holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible to provide paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.
- If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure any additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only TRW club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive.
- Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive
