#### GO-GO DANCERS — THE SEQUEL

14/15 SEPTEMBER 1990

#### SAN MIGUEL PASSAGE

PEACE

MEMBERS \$160

(ALL INCLUSIVE)

**NON-MEMBERS \$180** 

We will board the PEACE in Ventura Marina between 8:00 PM and midnight on Thursday, 13 September, for an early AM departure on the 14th. We will probably head out to the south side of SANTA ROSA Island making one or two dives before rounding SOUTH POINT and heading into the main target for this charter, the SAN MIGUEL PASSAGE. We will work our way up the west coast of the Island, well into the SAN MIGUEL PASSAGE, past the wreck of the "Chickasaw" and on to the SCALLOP (large!) and FISH reefs near BEE ROCK and/or LITTLE WILSON'S, both of which are just spectacular and also great for underwater PHOTOGRAPHY/VIDEO. Depending on the time element and weather conditions, we will either head further north to SANDY POINT or turn around and backtrack to CLUSTER POINT to complete our diving in shallower ABALONE waters. We anticipate making making five to seven dives for the day. We will then overnight at one of several spots depending on weather and partake of our typical full gourmet dinner and accompaniments. The following day (Saturday, the 15th) we will retrace some of our first day path and then begin our run back to Ventura. We anticipate three or four dives the second day.

Our return trip will be complimented by late lunch/early dinner. There will also be a drawing for a sign-in prize and a booby (dumb, not physical attributes!) prize. This trip promises some great outer island diving, dining and cruising. Weather conditions permitting, this trip is suitable for all skill levels; however, if in any doubt, check your dive plan with the divemasters on duty. If you can't or don't dive, you can always hot tub.

For sign-up call Scott (Williams) at (213) 371-9985 or Allen (Parker) at (213) 813-2955 for more information. THIS ONE SHOULD BE FUN - AS USUAL! As of this writing the boat is full, but there are always cancellations -- money talks!

#### **ENCORE ON FARNSWORTH**

We made Farnsworth! We had a very warm, bright, sunny day with only long period ocean swells to contend with. Even the current was very low during our dive on Farnsworth. The Encore crew dropped a marker buoy on the 55 foot "high spot," then anchored about 30 yards from the buoy. The swim from the boat to the buoy was relatively easy, except for the swells, which were up to 8–10 feet at times. Descending from the marker, we had 20–30 foot visibility until about 45–50 foot depth, at which a plankton cloud reduced visibility to 10–15 feet, which continued until about the 100 foot depth, where the visibility returned to 25–50 feet.

John D, Dave G and I made most of the dive between 110 and 120 feet, staying beneath the plankton. Other divers stayed at less depth and did not realize that the visibility was much better deeper down. As always, this was a spectacular dive, but as always required careful monitoring of depth, time and air consumption.

After discussion with the divemasters, the Execs on board, and skipper/owner Roger Hess, we elected to head back to the front side of Catalina to get out of the swells hitting the backside and reducing visibility in the shallower areas. We eventually anchored off Johnson's Landing in about 50 feet of calm water. Divers had several options — head for the small rock formation off the bow of the boat, head up current (not too bad) behind the boat, or head into the beach and shallower water. All options had their merits and several green abalone, scallops and some fish were grabbed. Visibility varied from 10–20 feet in the deeper water to 6–15 feet shallower.

Our next stop was at Isthmus Cove (aka Windy Gulch), just to the west of Bird Rock. Surface wind and resultant chop made for an interesting surface swim, especially on snorkel. The best diving was on the wall which runs on the north side of the Bird Rock reef structure. Very pretty with visibility in the 15–25 foot range.

Back on the boat we began our run back to 22nd Street, arriving somewhat later than usual (near 7:00 PM). It has been a kind of a lazy diver's day, with lots of hot sun, a couple of shallow dives and our initial very relaxed arrival and dive on Farnsworth. I'd do it again!

#### WING ON WING

"Gawd damnit Maverick, you never, never leave your wingman!!!"

I don't know how many times I have had to read in dive magazines and periodicals about a diving accident or near accident, "Well, my dive buddy and I started out the dive together but lost each other during the dive then surfaced later 25 yards apart." Another good one is, "Well, there I was, out of air at 80 feet and my dive buddy was 25 feet below me and 100 feet horizontally away from me."


Did you ever see the movie "Top Gun" witn Tom Cruise as "Maverick" the shoot from the hip pilot who always broke the rules of flying? I have been lucky enough to have flown a jet fighter and while we were flying, we were flying the classic "wing-on-wing" formation. Did you ever see the Blue Angels flying intheir diamond formation and wonder how they ever did it? This is how it is done. The leadman flies his course with his eyes straight ahead and the wingman flies his aircraft slightly behind the leadman's shoulder with his eyes on the leadman's aircraft. The wingman stays at the same altitude and distance from the leadman by adjusting with his control stick and throttle. "Wing-on-wing" formation flying is accomplished this way and it does not matter how many aircraft are in the formation. The only guy or gal with his eyes straight ahead is the leadman or leadwoman. Diving in the ocean is quite a bit like flying a jet fighter in the air. You have a lot of "airspace" or "seaspace" to get lost in. The reason a fighter pilot never leaves his wingman is he can't protect him if one of them leaves the formation. They protect each other by flying "wing-on-wing." It has been this way since the beginning days of flying in World War I. A diver can't provide air or assistance to a troubled dive buddy if the dive buddy wanders away from him. In the movie "Top Gun," Tom Cruise (Maverick) finally learns to stay with his wingman and comes out a winner!

I really enjoy diving in this same manner. I prefer to use the compass and discuss what course we will take with my dive buddies when we are planning our dive. If I am the leadman I follow the course and my wingman is usually to the right. If my wingman wants to be on the left, it works equally well. If my wingman wants to take the leadman's position and lead, I fall back and take the wingman's position in the formation. I like to use a mask with side windows for peripheral vision to give me a better reference of where my wingman is in relation to position. This method can also be performed with a conventional mask. If I know my wingman is to my right

and every minute or so we check each other, we never lose our dive buddy.

The basic principle of dive buddy diving is a good one, but what do you do if you lose your dive buddy? You are down there by yourself, wondering if he is OK, and what would you do if you had an emergency with no dive buddy to rely on because he just kicked away from you. After a short wait, the only thing you can really do is surface and hope he or she is OK. When you dive "wing-on-wing," you don't have this problem because you always stay in contact with your dive buddy. What if you are going through a nice small canyon and you can't be side by side? It's OK for a following diver to be directly behind the leadman as long as the leadman looks back every minute or so to keep your dive buddy reference. The most important thing in this technique is staying at the same altitude (depth). It is not good to have a dive buddy 25 feet below you if you run out of air for some reason. Similarly, it is not good to have a dive buddy 25 feet above you and you are visually scanning all over the place trying to find him or her. He or she may be able to see you, but chances are, you will not be even aware that he or she is right above you. One time my dive buddy "vanished" and I started a 360 degree scanning pattern looking up and down as I turned searching for him. My dive buddy realized I was looking for him and then tapped me on the head. He was directly above me and I never knew it! I know it sounds funny now, but had he and I kept in contact we would never have been separated.

When I surface from a dive and we have been diving "wing-on-wing," I say to myself, that dive was a pure pleasure. I would be very pleased if some of information was of value to you all in your future dives. The main objective is to be safe out there and promote diving safety. Diving with a good wingman or wingwoman is a pure pleasure.

#### THE PRINCESS GETS BITCHY . . . !

After all was said and done, the "Princess Louise" had the final word! With the 2,300 ton liner finally floating — sort of — a decision was made that she would be resunk, not for divers off Point Vicente, but for all time in 5,000 feet of ocean southwest of Santa Catalina Island. On 20 June 1990 in the early AM, the ship was towed out of Terminal Island Berth 241 and into a calm ocean. About nine miles off Point Fermin, she suddenly capsized at about 2:08 PM and sank mid—channel in 900 feet of water. The Envrionmental Protection Agency is not impressed, as the Burial Spot is "too close" to the main—land and "too close" to a controlled and monitored ocean dump area. For us divers, it's not "close enough," unless you're heavy into long term saturation diving for artifacts. Ah well . . . better luck next wreck . . . !!

## Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber

The Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber is located on the Catalina Marine Science Center campus of the University of Southern California near Two Harbors on Santa Catalina Island – approximately 22 miles off-shore from the Los Angeles harbor. The chamber is internationally recognized as a center for hyperbaric treatment of diving casualties, education, and research.

This facility is unique in the Pacific southwest as one of the larger chambers available to the public specifically for the treatment of diving casualties. An oceanfront pier and a FAA specified heliport allow this facility to receive patients by boat, helicopter, or land vehicle-day or night. The cylindrical chamber is multi-place, double-lock chamber; 9 feet in diameter, 24 feet long, with operational depths to 225 feet of seawater. It is large enough to allow for the treatment of several patients at one time. More hyper-acute diving casualties are probably treated successfully at this facility than anywhere else in the world. A staff of highly trained volunteers is on-call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to deal handle diving related emergencies.

Training and continuing education in the areas of diving physiology and medicine, chamber operations, and diving accident management are long-standing commitments to the diving community. Requests for specific education and training of medical/paramedical personnel, diving instructors, state and federal agencies, and international companies have resulted in a number of flexible and practical training programs - often providing exposure to actual hyperbaric treatments.

The WILD WAVE, Mickey and his gang go on vacation from 22nd Street to Ventura Marina in August each year. This year we will be taking the WILD WAVE to WILSON ROCK and TALCOTT SHOALS, on a single day charter.

We will make the overnight run on the north side of the Channel Islands arriving at WILSON ROCK early in the morning of the fourth. WILSON ROCK is located just over two miles northwest of Harris Point on SAN MIGUEL island, and is really exposed to the forces of the ocean. There are two wash rocks at the southeastern end of the WILSON ROCK plateau which is about one mile long and three quarters of a mile wide. There are many pinnacles and flat expanses of rock with sheer walls, plateaus, crevices and ledges to explore at tremendously varying depths, all with a rich variety of marine life. For the hunter SCALLOPS, ABALONE, and FISH abound. For the PHOTO and/or VIDEO folks and the LOOKY-LOOS there is almost every form of California sea-life to be seen. It is one of the top two or three dive spots in southern California. In good conditions diving is relatively easy. Otherwise, due to currents, depths (to over sport dive limits), surface chop, and a swinging boat, diving will be limited to the advanced corps. Sea Diver divemasters will assist in dive planning.

Following our WILSON ROCK dive we will head back to the TALCOTT SHOALS area, which is a series of shelf-like reefs located off the northwest end of SANTA ROSA Island. The reefs vary in depth from a shallow crest at 10 feet where the wreck of the "Aggi Norge" (a 265 foot steel-hulled Norwegian sailing ship) lies, to depths of 60 and 70 feet. The reefs are home for a tremendous variety of marine life, including ABALONE, SCALLOPS and FISH. Although LOBSTER are out of season, they are quite plentiful in this area, and it never hurts to scout these little beauties out for later reference!?! Opportunities for great PHOTO and/or VIDEO are plentiful. We will make two or three dives in the TALCOTT area, which stretches for several miles along the SANTA ROSA coast. Weather conditions permitting the dive(s) will be suitable for all skill levels. Divemasters will assist in dive decision making. After our two or three dives at TALCOTT are over, we will head back to Ventura with our now established full steak late lunch/early dinner WILD WAVE style.

The WILD WAVE charter to the outer Channel Islands the last two years proved very popular and there will be some "extracurricular activities" this year!? Be sure to be on board by calling Scott (Williams) at (213) 371-9985. For additional information call Allen (Parker) at (213) 813-2955. Boarding will begin at 9:00 PM on the 3rd for a midnight departure.

The boat will be docked near the Channel Islands Visitor Center at the end of Spinnaker Drive. See directions to the "PEACE."

## External Otitis or Swimmer's Ear



What is it?

External otitis is an infection of your ear canal caused by bacteria and/or fungi.

The infection rarely involves the inner ear and therefore seldom leads to permanent hearing loss. External otitis is usually brought on by water in the ear canal.

Frequently, pain is severe because the swollen canal skin separates from the bony ear canal creating pain similar to that from constant pressure on a sore blister. Sometimes the canal



opening swells shut, and it is necessary for a physician to insert a wick so that medicine can reach all of the infection.

The condition often recurs over a period of years, and may become chronic.

#### How Do We Treat It

1. Do not clean or scratch your ear canals. It will be difficult to restrain yourself since the ear may itch or feel blocked. Any manipulation will prolong the agony and hinder healing. Ear drops or cream can be prescribed to relieve this symptom.

2. Do not wash your ears or allow any water to run into the canals. The infection is usually made worse by water, so keep it away from your ears. If you need to wash your hair, gently place a small amount of cotton or lamb's wool in the opening of the ear canal and seal over the cotton with Vaseline. Do not leave the cotton in your ear since the humidity in your canal will rise and interfere with healing.

3. Do not stop using the ear medication your ear specialist prescribes before the end of the prescription, regardless of how well your ears feel. This helps to prevent the return of the infection by killing remaining bacteria and fungi. If your doctor has put a wick in your ear, place the drops on the wick; pull the wick out in 48 hours.

If the wick falls out before then, this means that the canal swelling is decreasing and it is now possible to put the drops directly into the ear canal. Pain in the ear and neck is common and is seldom relieved for at least 48 hours. If your outer ear swells and turns red, discontinue the drops; you may have an allergy to the medicine in them. Call or return to your physicians office for a change of therapy. If your ear pain has not been relieved in two days or if your ears don't feel completely well within 10 days, call the office for a return appointment.

#### How Can You Help Prevent Its Return

After healing is completed, you may bathe, wash your hair and swim as usual; always treat your ear canals with rubbing alcohol after swimming.

To do this, tip your head to one side, fill the ear canal with alcohol, and allow it to remain in for a minute. Then straighten up and allow the alcohol to run out. Dry only the outer ear. Repeat in the other ear. This treatment helps to dry the canal skin and prevent recurrence of symptoms.

If your ears have gotten very wet during bathing or hair-washing treat them with alcohol as above. Do not put Q-tips or any other object in your ear canals. Doing so can irritate the canal skin, and allow bacteria to invade the skin.

If your infection does return, make another office appointment with your ear doctor. External otitis can be caused by many different bacteria or fungi, and repeat infections may need different treatments. If there are further recurrences, adding 1/3 white vinegar to 2/3 isopropyl alcohol will usually prevent recurrences.

Check with DAN or your doctor's office if you have any other questions.

I've just returned from an absolutely wonderful week spent aboard the MV Ocean Spirit, the diving cruise ship which visits the renowned dive sites of Guanaja and Roatan in the Bay Islands, Belize and Cozumel. Also on the cruise were David and Barbara Serena, as well as Linda and John Dines, who were celebrating their honeymoon. The cruise commenced for me in an exciting way. My planes misconnected and I had to take a sea taxi to catch up with the ship just before it left the Tampa/St. Petersburg harbor for the open sea and then I had to jump on board. 

#### DIVE BOAT POLICY

- A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:
- a) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, full payment must be received by boat reservationist.
- b) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- c) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to
- dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.

  d) If payment in full is not received by the deadline the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservation is will assist in this process, but is not responsible to provide paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure any additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
