FROM THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE

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

The 1990/1991 bug season opens Wednesday, 3 October 1990. Between 5:30 and 6:00 AM on Friday, 5 October, we will be dropping anchor at SAN NICOLAS in quest of those very bugs. Yes, that's right, this is a Friday single day dive --- a new venture for The Sea Divers. The SAN NICOLAS EXPRESS will leave 22nd Street at 12:01 AM on the 5th for a typical fast run, allowing for an early AM night dive. Don't forget your lights and chem lights. We anticipate making four to six dives, depending on weather, dive spots and diver ocean time -- quick in -- quick out -- MORE DIVES! SAN NICOLAS can still provide the big LOBSTER, and we will be running a contest, with an appropriate award for the largest bug taken. Large FISH of various types also inhabit the island environs, so you spear merchants will have your own challenge on this trip.

Perhaps surprisingly the trip is already filling fast -- call Scott (Williams) at 213-371-9985 for sign-up for this very early-in-LOBSTER-season special. The dive is suitable for all skill levels -- ocean conditions being reasonable, and we will tailor the dives to the skill levels signed up. The return trip will include a full steak dinner, and a modicum of wine for those interested. GET YOUR FIRST BUG HERE!

SHAKY START LEADS TO A GREAT FINISH

The twin hurricanes off Baja brought high surf to the Southern California area just before our July two-day on the "Charisma" to Begg Rock, San Nicolas and Santa Barbara. The surf was great for surfers, the attendant seas and swells not so great for divers! Needless to say, as we all boarded the boat Thursday evening, we were rightfully not real confident on reaching Begg. Three of our divers no-showed (at \$165 apiece!!) even though we waited well past anticipated departure, and one of the deck hands (Mike) hit a grating on his bicycle and arrived bleeding and battered; Roger Hess, owner/skipper, replaced him with grandson Roger prior to departure. As we nosed out through the L.A. gate, we mused the shaky start to the two day with real apprehension!

We initially headed towards San Nicolas and maybe Begg Rock, but before reaching the West End of Catalina, the skipper decided enough was enough, and we U-turned south and ended up just after dawn at Pyramid at the southeast end of San Clemente — in calm, sheltered water! The initial dive allayed some of our disappointment — the water temperature was close to 70 degrees F, no current, no real waves, and visibility in the 30–50 foot region. This was to be the case for both days of diving with, if anything, visibility improving at some of the dive spots. We worked our way up the front side of San Clemente making three dives along the way in water varying from a few feet to 70+ feet in depth, depending on diver choice and/or bottom time. Late in the afternoon, we made a run to the outside area of Northwest Harbor where we made the last daylight dive, and subsequently a night dive at about 8:00 PM. We, therefore, had six really excellent dives the first day, with most limiting out on green and/or pink abalone, and having provided spectacular reefs for the looky-loos and the photo-ites.

After steak dinner and the usual "Charisma"/Sea Diver trimmings, we discussed our second day options and elected — about 27 to 9 — to remain at San Clemente making a partial overnight run back to Pyramid Cove for the remainder of a very quiet and comfortable overnight.

Saturday, the second day saw a somewhat lazy start to the day's diving, with the first group hitting the water, on the spectacular reef on the very tip of the island, at about 7:30 AM. We then moved up on the front side once more, picking different spots than on the first day. In all, we made four dives with two occurring at the same spot which was just beautiful. Again, many of our group limited on the second day abalone quota. We began our run back to 22nd Street at 1:15 PM, arriving at the dock just after 6:30 PM. The diving and the weather had been just superb for both days.

Other items to note were the prizes/awards made as advertized. The sign-in prize (a \$25 club certificate) was won by Sue Hoehn; the early sign-up/pay in full prize (a single day boat dive) by yours truly — finally won something!; the story telling contest (a dive mask) by Michael Borden; and last, but by no means least, the boobie prize (also a \$25 club certificate) by John Delaney. The boobie was hotly contested by Wes Stepp, Kathy Dacey, Rose Silva, Sharon Hale, David Serena, Ron Gross, Bob Stivers, Eric Storsteen and myself — we had a fun trip!! Several of the boobies related in one way or another to divers trying to initiate a dive without air — double check the air supply folks, it's embarassing to say the least!! Back to Delaney's success story: he had a string going — thought the trip was going out of Ventura and was saved (accidently) by a phone call; made the first dive leaving his trusty computers on the boat — tables the rest of the day; suited up with his regulator trapped under his backpack making breathing quite difficult; tried to hitch a ride back to the boat, hanging on to another diver's game bag (he thought it was me); and finally, for providing more quotes for the month than anyone else.

Everyone appeared to have had a great trip, with some outstanding diving, perfect weather, and a great group of Sea Divers . . . if you haven't been on one of our two-day dives recently, you really ought to try one . . . we do enjoy!

THE WILD WAVE PULLS ONE OFF

Wilson Rock -- I personally was zero for seven (or more) attempts going into the August dive, planned for Wilson Rock and Talcott Shoals. Needless to say, I was not real confident on making it this trip, as both Thursday and Friday were somewhat breezy, as the weak front moved through.

All were on board by 11:00 PM, ready for our 12:01 AM departure from Ventura Marina. New skipper was Joel Ingran, the Wild Wave's perennial deck hand. John Pittman was also on board — Mikey having another shot at "retirement" — we'll see! Joel ran the big V-12s hard, arriving at the Cuyler Harbor area of San Miguel a little after 4:00 AM (!?!), and too soon to attempt anchorage on Wilson Rock. We idled around until first light a little after 5:30 AM and finally anchored with the boat in about 200 feet of water and the anchor line draped over one of the adjacent reefs at about 45 feet. Conditions were not perfect, but manageable by advanced divers. Surface waves and swirling currents near the exposed rock were the primary difficulties and it was realtively dark at depth. About 18 of our group made the dive, with a choice of depths from about 40 feet to well over 100 feet. Surprisingly most of the scallops were on the upper levels of the area we dove. There were large fish, and at least one 8-10 foot shark. The dive is spectacular — a world class dive in diving jargoneze. Back on the boat, with my five large scallops, I finally realized I had made it, and moved from 0 for 7 to 1 for 8.

We then cruised into the Harris Point area near March Rock on the north side of San Miguel. Visibility varied, it was calm and there was no current. Scallops were the primary order of the dive -- I got three more biggies -- but large fish (including halibut) and a few red abalone were bagged. Following this dive we idled over to Talcott Shoals on the north side of Santa Rosa, trying to build up surface time. We made two dives in about 50-60 feet in excellent visibility. visibility. More scallops -- got my limit -- fish (including more halibut) and a few red abalone were taken. Photographers had excellent opportunities on all four of the dives.

As we left Talcott to begin our run back to Ventura, the wind was coming up but who cared -- we'd made it! We had a full steak lunch/early dinner with all the goodies including several varieties of wine. The sun came out and capped off a great day of diving.

We made two awards. The boobie prize (a \$25 club certificate) went to Pat Cocoran, one of seven or so Douglas Club members on the trip — for leaving his weight belt, mask, snorkel, ab iron and other goodies in "the bucket at home." John Delaney (again), Kathleen Bennett, Robin Grant, Art Hill, Bob Stivers and Gary Hartung were also in the running. We made a special award (T-shirt, etc.) to Joel Ingram for passing his skipper's license and for making Wilson Rock and in world record time at that. As Kathi Mc was heard to say, "Does Mickey know you beat the shit out of his boat this morning?" Great trip — thanks Wild Wave.

AN IMPORTANT REMINDER

Our charter boat skippers and the Sea Divers remind you that Fish and Game regulations should be adhered to at all times. We have noted several divers taking excess abalone (limit of two per day) and excess scallops (limit of ten per day). Also, be very sure not to take any game that is undersize, especially abalone which will probably die, even if they are carefully replaced.

SEA DIVERS 1990 DIVEMASTER TRAINING PROGRAM

The Divemaster's job is to organize and conduct safe and enjoyable dives for certified divers. The purpose of this program is to make available advanced training to help scuba divers prepare for certification as Divemaster. However, divers interested in only part of the program may enroll for that part. PARTICIPATION IS OPEN TO ALL CERTIFIED SCUBA DIVERS.

The training requirements to qualify as a Divernaster in The Sea Divers Club include:

- Current First Aid Certification
- Current CPR Certification
- Rescue Diver Certification by a Nationally Recognized Agency

All of these criteria will be offered by Course Directors of this Divernaster Course.

In addition, course candidates are required to have a medical examination.

BECOME A DIVEMASTER

The Sea Divers Club is about to start a Diversater training program.

As you probably know, our Divernasters are looked up to as highly respected members of the diving community, not only by our club, but by many others in the area. Our reputation with the various dive boat skippers is quite gratifying and is the result of the hard work and the conscientious attitude of our present Divernasters.

Becoming a Divernaster means that you are an active diver, that you want to learn more and increase your skills in the areas of diving safety, and that you are willing to take on the responsibility of guiding and guarding the safety and actions of the divers in our club.

As a Divemaster you will receive training in four broad categories. The first concerns accident prevention and will enable you to <u>spot</u> problems prior to happening which is the best way! You will gain the ability to determine when diving conditions are or are not the safest and act accordingly.

The second area of training concerns rescue techniques. Here you will learn how to approach a diver in distress, how to resuscitate him or her in water if necessary, how to transport them through the water and through the surf line to safety.

The third category of training involves the medical aspects of diving. This covers the various causes of diving "diseases", how to recognize their symptoms, how to treat them and finally how to avoid them.

The final area of training will cover the administrative aspects of being a Divernaster. Here you will learn what your authority and responsibilities are relative to divers, boat captains, lifeguards and civil authorities.

There are many benefits to be derived from becoming a Divemaster. Perhaps the most important is the self improvement that you will realize in your own diving ability. Then there is the satisfaction to be gained helping others and in being "one of the elite". The club incidentally does offer incentives for being a Divemaster - For every 3 times (dive trips) as a Divemaster, you earn a free (1 day) boat dive.

The prerequisites to receive the Divermaster training are quite simple. You must be a club member, be a certified diver, have the desire to help others and want to improve your own diving skills.

DAN Takes a Stand For The Environment

t seems as if the world awoke in 1989 to the fact that we live on a very small planet. Planet Earth -planet "ocean" if you really think about it is far more sensitive, than many realized, to the continuing exploitation of its valuable and rare resources.

Environmental concerns may seem like strange sentiments from a diving safety organization like Divers Alert Network. But, we all have a personal stake in the environment. Divers, like all underwater creatures, need clean waters to swim in too.

Beginning with the last issue of Alert Diver. nearly all DAN paper products will be printed on recycled paper. We've already banned styrofoam cups from our office and will begin using shredded wastepaper for packaging instead of plastic or styrofoam.

Granted, these are small steps, but it's a lifestyle our organization is living by, and one we hope will be taken up by others. DAN also applauds other groups who are directly involved in protecting the environment.

One program deserving special mention is PADI's Project A.W.A.R.E. (Aquatic World Awareness Responsibility and Education). This special diver-supported program aims to educate the diving public to the continuing assault of the marine environment and to assist efforts to protect our underwater heritage.

Another diver-supported group is Project Reefkeeper, an organization that preserves our fragile coral reef system. Far too many coral reefs are damaged by uneducated or careless divers.

Want to do more, right now? Here are three simple actions to help conserve our oceans:

Snip six-pack rings —

Before you toss six-pack holders, snip each circle with a scissors. When you're on the beach, pick up any six-pack rings you find and snip them before you throw them away. Six-pack holders are virtually invisible underwater, so marine animals can't avoid them. Result: they drown or strangle themselves. Young seals and sea lions get the rings caught around their necks. As they grow, the rings get tighter, and the animals suffocate.

2. Use less plastic —

Plastic bags, and other waste often wind up in the ocean and kill marine animals that get tangled up in them or swallow them.

3. Stamp out styrofoam —

Polystyrene foam is completely non-biodegradable; it just won't go away. Because it won't go away, it floats on ocean surfaces, breaks up into pellets resembling food, and is consumed. When sea turtles, for example, eat "styrofoam," its buoyancy keeps them from diving, clogs their systems and they starve to death.



DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.

 B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment
- in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.

 For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive be the dive and advised that payment in full
- is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.

 D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

 Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his undive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
