

THE TWO DAY TO CORTEZ

2/3 NOVEMBER 1990 MEMBERS \$135 CORTEZ BANKS

We have not dived CORTEZ BANKS since a two-day affair in October of 1984. We planned a charter in early March 1989 and in February 1990 but bad weather prevailed both times, so we'll try again — this time later in the year — and for two days. CORTEZ is a great LOBSTER area!!

CORTEZ BANKS is located about 80 miles SSW of 22nd Street, about 40 miles SW of China Point on San Clemente Island and is almost directly west of San Diego. As it is an exposed dive spot, the BANKS have not been dived as much as some of the closer in areas. Diving depths range from 20 to 80 feet providing generally excellent game taking possibilities. LOBSTER in particular have been abundant and the various reefs making up the BANKS are home to many species of good sized FISH. PHOTO and VIDEO buffs will not be disappointed.

This dive is generally considered an intermediate to advanced dive due to the BANKS full exposure to the ocean. However, relative beginners can make the dives, assuming that ocean conditions relative to surge and/or current are within acceptable limits. The Sea Diver divemasters should be consulted on your dive plan and/or experience.

This is a great dive area and the charter is filling early. Call Scott (Williams) at (213) 371-9985 or Allen (Parker) at (213) 813-2955 for further details. Boarding will begin at 9:00 PM on the 1st for a prompt midnight departure from 22nd Street. As the run there and back will be fairly long, we plan some additional goodies for this trip.

SCALLOPS GALORE!

Small craft warnings were out when we left the dock on board the "Peace" in the early hours of 14 September. The ride over was definitely bumpy except when in the lee of the islands — problem was that the lee, for once, was on the north side and we took the southerly route! By the time we reached the Johnson's Lee area of Santa Rosa, the southerly seas were calming some and we made our first dive just east of South Point. Visibility was about 10-15' on the bottom at about 70' depth, with 20-30' visibility only 10' to 15' off the bottom. This spot yielded red abalone limits for the first day for several divers.

We then moved into the San Miguel Passage --- our real destination --- dropping anchor in somewhat rough water just south of Cluster Point. Owner/skipper Bill Magee announced the spot as great for abalone, with one small reef ahead of the boat, and a large reef behind the boat. When most divers left from the bow gate, the boat was riding roughly eastwest. Most of us missed the small reef which was at 60' depth, and backtracked to the large reef. Both reefs supplied some red abalone, for those not yet limited, and a few scallops. Return to the boat was sporty. The boat had swung from its initial east-west position to a north-south orientation, thus placing it further away from surfacing divers. The current was the wrong way as a result, and surface conditions were somewhat difficult.

Several divers elected to be picked up by the "Peace's" new runabout; others got help from current lines. Following this minor escapade, we elected to retreat from the channel and cruised back to Ford Point for our third dive. Visibility was similar to the first dive in slightly shallower water. Some abalone, a few scallops, and several nice fish were taken. We then pulled anchor and cruised around East Point into the Santa Cruz Channel to dive a small scallop-laden reef—near Carrington Point on the northeast tip of Santa Rosa. Yeah!! Scallops—limits for the day for almost anyone who persisted in poor visibility, some surge and a strong current. Fortunately, Bill had anchored the "Peace" right over the reef, making return to the boat relatively easy.

We were now looking for our overnight anchorage and decided to cross the Santa Cruz Channel to Fraser Point on the northwest tip of Santa Cruz Island. We anchored and essentially split into three groups — divers, hot-tubbers, and shore leave. Visibility for divers was better than at Santa Rosa, with abalone being the primary take. Hot-tubbers got warm, and eight people took the shore boat and walked the Fraser Point area for about an hour — this was my choice! Dinner was served typical "Peace" style at about 7:00 PM, followed by after dinner "activities" which were many and varied, some chosing to dive, others to relax and just enjoy the company, while others got well into the party mood.

"Go-Go Dancers - The Sequel" did not feature, but "Hot Tub Fantasies" did -- you had to be there! The boat settled down and by prior understanding, the anchor was raised relatively late for our move to the first dive spot of the second day. The move around Fraser Point was definitely ROUGH! We anchored on the north side of the point and made two dives, one at the initial anchorage, then one about 200 yards further north. Both spots were similar with lots of kelp, pretty reefs, 60-70' depth and 20-30' visibility.

For our final dive(s) we cruised along the relatively calm north side of Santa Cruz, dropping anchor near Arch Rock. Depending on diver desire, there were sandy areas for halibut or the rock and arch area for scallops. I headed for more scallops — most limited out for the second day. The halibut hunters were not so lucky! Water depth was up to 55' under the boat and the reef was from 50' to zero.

Diving over, our run back to Ventura was about three hours. The food on board was outstanding as usual, and the crew very helpful and friendly. Other boats can learn a lot from the "Peace." Oh! — the awards. Dicey S. won the \$25 gift certificate for the sign—in prize — she drew the number herself!! Art Hill won the booby prize (a tank carrier) —— just! He was "rescued" on the second dive — the worst fear of a divemaster — and suited up once with his regulator trapped under his back—pack. Others in strong contention were: Faisal H. for struggling to get into one cold wet leg of his wet suit and getting his right leg into the left wet suit leg; Bob S. for sleeping naked with the curtain open — no big thing; Rhonda the galley girl for "overpartying"; the Peter L. and Dexter K. buddy team for both losing their tanks — one on deck and the other underwater — really!; and the Kathy D. and Wes S. buddy team for their collective antics trying to spear and bag one poor little fish — a comedy of errors too long to relate. Kathy D. also gets an honorable mention for the huge plastic (unfortunately) boobs she wore — Bill Magee's eyes about popped out of their sockets. Frank H. also rates an honorable mention for being "rescued" twice, and for neatly drying his hair (with a hair dryer!) after completing diving — must have had a hot date! Another great trip on the "Peace." See you in December.

SEA DIVERS - 1990 DIVEMASTER TRAINING PROGRAM

The Sea Divers Club is beginning a divemaster training program. First meeting is Wednesday, 3 October, at 7:00 PM, at Ken and Dicie Sizemore's home at 4515 Toucan Street, Torrance. Cost of the course will be approximately \$200 per student. IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT YOU ATTEND THE FIRST MEETING ON OCTOBER 3RD WHEN THE COURSE SCHEDULE WILL BE PLANNED.

Divemaster training will be given in four broad categories: accident prevention, rescue techniques, medical aspects of diving and the administrative aspects of being a divemaster. There are many benefits to be derived from participating in divemaster training. The most important is the self improvement that you will realize in your own diving ability. The prerequisites for divemaster training are that you are an active club member, are a certified diver, have the desire to help others and want to improve your own diving skills. In addition, you must have a medical certification from your physician.

Upon successful completion of the course, the following certifications will be available:

- First Aid
- CPR
- NAUI Rescue Diver Speciality
- NAUI Divemaster

EMERGENCY RESPONSE DIVER

Diving emergency. Tragedy. At times only knowledge, skill and practice separate them.

You get all three from the Emergency Response Diver Course. The Emergency Response Diver course, offered by the Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber, focuses on practical field experience — what can and should be done at the scene of a diving accident. You'll learn:

- The best way to handle a victim in the water.
- How to administer effective CPR and first aid.
- What techniques to use for beach and boat rescues.
- How to make the best use of emergency oxygen.
- How to efficiently manage the dive accident scene.
- Specific methods for aiding victims of air embolism, decompression sickness, hypothermia, neardrowning, and other diving medical maladies.

Practice, Practice, Practice

The Emergency Response Diver course is field-oriented. You'll spend most of your time at, near, or in the water practicing rescues; or in small groups mastering first aid, CPR, and emergency oxygen use. You'll learn how to direct people at the scene of a diving accident, how to communicate effectively with rescue and emergency medical agencies, and how to coordinate transportation. Most important, you'll apply what you learn in practical and realistic field simulations conducted by experienced rescue professionals.

Certifications

Certifications for Advanced First Aid, CPR, and NAUI/NASAR Oxygen Therapy are included with the course. Optional certifications from NAUI and PADI in Dive Rescue and Medic First Aid will be available for a small administrative fee. Continuing Education Units are available for qualified DMTs and CA paramedic and MICNs.

Course Location, Date, Cost and Prequisites

This five day course will be held on the campus of the USC Marine Science Center, home of the Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber on Catalina Island on October 21-26, 1990. The cost, including room and board, tuition, and materials is \$645. A recent diver medical signed by a physician, and dive log for the past year are required for each participant. 

THE SEA DIVERS 1990 DIVE BOAT BONUS PROGRAM

- The program is open only to club members.
- Members must have supported a minimum of three dive days (i.e., three single day dives or one two-day and one single day).
- Free trips do not count, nor do club certificate dollars.
- For diversasters all days count, dollar amounts will count to the extent received by the club.
- Base period will be 1 January 1990 through 30 November 1990.
- The club will pay a 5% bonus on dollar amounts accrued by qualifying members.
- The bonus can only be used on the Peace two-day scheduled for 16/17 December 1990. The bonus amount will be refunded to each qualified diver on the dive.
- The program has been approved by the Executive Committee.

Ten Suggestions to Help Preserve our Reefs and its Inhabitants

1. Buoyancy Control Is The Key To Considerate Diving

When divers are neutrally buoyant, they need not make contact with any part of the reef, particularly with fragile stony corals or with sponges. We usually remember how sharp the stony coral skeletons are, but we often forget that the same coral which cuts us can also cut the flesh of the living coral.

2. Don't Plant Yourself On The Reef

It can take years of growth to replace what you break in a careless second.

3. Don't Kick Up Sand

Sponges and corals feed by filtering tiny planktonic particles from the water. Clouds of sand prevent these animals from filtering the water and they can starve to death.

4. Know By Instinct Where Your Fins Are

If you must land somewhere, you'll be able to land softly on the smallest area that you can, preferably on your fin tips — and on the sand instead of on something that's alive.





5. Touch Things Only With Your Bare Hands

Wearing gloves does 't give you any idea of what something feels like and allows you to touch hard enough to cause damage. Leaning on corals, and other marine animals, with extension tubes, underwater lights, or dive knives gives you no tactile information and can cause great harm.

6. Consider What You're Doing From The Animals Viewpoint

Most of the animals you approach are much smaller and quieter than you — imagine the mental stress you would experience if you were approached by a creature many times your size, making unnaturally loud breathing noises.

7. Let The Marine Animals Stay In Their Own Comfort Zones


Most of the animals you approach are also a lot faster than you are, but that doesn't mean they like to be chased. Conchs can retract into their shells, and worms into their tubes, but seahorses can only struggle when grabbed and turtles need to get to the surface to breath.

8. Don't Grab Animals That Don't Want To Be Grabbed

Ask yourself, "If I let this animal go, would it come back?" If it wouldn't don't stress the animal. Look, enjoy, but don't touch.

9. Always Replace Animals In Their Habitats

Some animals can be safely separated form their habitats of choice. Always return a shrimp to the same anemone that it came from. Return an arrow crab to the same coral head, where surely its mate lives. Morays should probably not be forced from their habitats!



10. Consider What You're Training Animals To Do

By scattering food, divers have trained snapper, grouper, even moray eels, to nibble at exhaust bubbles, ear lobes and fingers. Porcupine fish have been trained to retreat frantically at the sight of a diver, having been forced to pose for "puffed (stressed) puffer" photos.

As some of us get ready for the club's first out-of-country dive experience in Cabo San Lucas later this month, it is not too soon to begin contemplating future club travel plans, especially Hedonism II.

The next dive experience being planned is to Cozumel next fall. Some of you may know local dive instructor Bob Brockel. He and Victoria Williamson are purchasing a small dive resort in Cozumel. It is not on the beach, but is nearby and is very reasonably priced. It also has the advantage of a good dive boat and Bob as the divemaster, so we will not be dependent on Mexican captains and panga boats. Bob can be guaranteed to show us some of the best, safest diving Cozumel has to offer. For bubblewatchers, there will be snorkeling, shopping and Mayan ruins to explore.

We will combine a stay at Bob's with a trip on Club Caribe, Cozumel's beautiful liveaboard, the OCEANUS. When Chandra, Linda D. and myself stayed at the club last summer we had a chance to inspect this boat and it is the most beautifully appointed one I have ever seen. It has 6 small staterooms which can accommodate 10 to 12 divers, plenty of deck space, and 2 compressors with 6 hoses each so all the tanks can be filled simultaneously. The OCEANUS makes a three night trip to the Chicchorro Banks — one of the last virgin dive areas left in the world. These banks lie on the reef system that runs between Palancar and Belize. As no one lives there, they have not been overfished as most of the Carribbean has, and the reefs have not been damaged by boatloads of novice divers. I need input from anyone who may be interested in this trip as to what dates would be good. Watch for a General Meeting program early next year on this destination.

There are several other projects in the planning stages including Ocean Quest, the Red Sea-Israel, and Truk in 1994. Once again, all ideas and input are greatly appreciated.



Wild Wave/Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant or if you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth which is by Hornblower's Restaurant (Slip #20).

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
