He even discovered a giant jellyfish - new to science and as yet unnamed - and the invertebrates that live upon it.

As the feature moves through the seasons, you'll discover how winds, tides, and currents shape Monterey Bay life. You'll see combat between an octopus and moray eel, and watch opalescent squid, borne on cold currents rising from the depths, breed, and die.




Our third charter this "new" LOBSTER season is to SANTA BARBARA Island (and The Sea Divers are in high gear having made a productive trip first time out to SAN NICOLAS). This is one of only two Sunday dives this year so you folks who have trouble getting Saturdays off should try for this one! November is typically a comfortable month for diving and we nearly always make SANTA BARBARA. Although the clocks will have fallen back from summer time, we hope to make an early AM night dive. Dive lights and new chem lights are a must.

Aside from LOBSTER, SANTA BARBARA offers just about every element for diving. The multiplicity of reefs, walls, arches and canyons provide superior opportunities for PHOTOGRAPHY and VIDEO. Add to that the extensive variety of sea life and typically great visibility and you've already got the best of diving. Some of the larger FISH inhabit the environs — so you spear hungry types will not be disappointed if the LOBSTER don't bite!

This trip is suitable for all levels of experience. Beginners and the less experienced intermediate divers should be aware that ocean conditions can be difficult in the event of high currents or surface wave action. Call Kathi (McNally) at (310) 370-1657 for signup. The dive is about half full as of late October, so don't delay!! We'll have our early FULL dinner, typical Sea Diver/WILD WAVE style. DON'T HOLD BACK, SANTA BARBARA BUGS AND FUN RIGHT HERE!!! Boarding begins at 7:00 PM on the 21st for a 2:00 AM departure.

OOPS!

The dive boat CEE RAY missed the breakwater entrance and ploughed into the breakwater rocks at 5:50 AM lobster opening night. The 26 divers and 6 crew members escaped uninjured, some jumping directly onto the breakwater, others jumping into the ocean and then swimming to the breakwater. The boat suffered approximately \$100,000 in damage and as viewed in the yard near 22nd Street is missing most of the bow below the deck line back about 10-12 feet. A major oopsie!







Other donations utilized in the goody bags or for the door prizes are listed on the next page.

At about 3:05 we presented a check to the Hyperbaric Chamber in the amount of \$2500.00, one of the largest donations made from any kind of money raising events. Steve Kavanaugh accepted on behalf of the chamber.

The Grand Prize was then drawn and was won by Danny Pyles, a recently certified diver (3 months!). His registration was picked up a Laguna Sea Sports in Laguna, who happened by chance to have flyers courtesy of David and Barb Serena looking for something to do one day rather than listen to the UCLA football team take a beating!! Strange world.

Other items of note: we do plan the Second Annual King Harbor Clean-up, tentatively scheduled for 24 October 1993; we ran out of T-Shirts (all 360) and will make another run; Southern California Edison had the most divers; Dive 'N Surf D ve Team the next and the Sea Divers third...lots of us were organizing!!! We only had one injury, a cut thigh from a broken aquarium.

BUGS GALORE - DIVING WITH A DIFFERENCE!

Our first lobster dive of 1992 was a real winner. The almost full boat of Sea Divers arrived off the north side of SAN NICOLAS at 06:45 am — dark!! About twenty of us made the early AM night dive in calm, clear (40-50 foot visibility) relatively warm 64 degree water, depths to 50 feet. Not bugs galore! We then moved into a small cove diving in 25-0 feet of water where bugs were to be found. Being WELL inside the 300 yard limit, Joel I was somewhat nervous about the Navy's reaction but they were busy on the other side of the island with other "encroachers."

Moving out into deeper water for dive number three we did the first of our no anchor or drift type dives. Although there was not much current, conditions were almost ideal for this kind of diving. With up to 60 feet of water, our dive profiles were not exactly perfect! As we came to the surface — all over the place?! — Joel I ran WILD WAVE taxi style and recovered us all. Again, a few bugs were the order with lots of fish as a back—up.

Dive number four was an interesting approach — drop off those divers wishing to dive shallow, then run out and drop off the rest in about 40 feet of water making "recoveries" as divers surfaced. Bugs were plentiful in both spots, but I think the deeper group won out. Water remained calm, with no current and temperatures in the mid to low 60's. Visibility continued to be outstanding for San Nic.

The fifth and last dive was different again — drop off groups of two through six every 50 yards or so, then loop back and pick up group and pick up group one and so on. Great stuff, especially for those divers who NEVER know where the boat is when it's anchored!!

We picked up the last diver at about 12:45 PM, ready to begin the fairly long run back to 22nd Street. A bug survey showed a take of 29 -- not bad for The Sea Divers! The largest was a real nice 8-1/2 pounder grabbed by Gus V along with several in the 4-6 pound category. The area of SAN NICOLAS that we dove is to be closed for about a year (we believe) so those 3-3/16" guys should be legal in 1994!! It was good to see lots of small lobster -- at least they are proliferating unlike the abalone which just seem to be in total decline.

Our run back was calm and nice! We had our usual plentiful steak barbeque with baked potatoes, baked beans, etc., etc., and a modicum of wine, arriving back at the dock about 6:30 PM. We watched for boobies but saw none worthy of note so gave the boobie prize – a TRW frisbee – to Erica, Gerry P's daughter who came out with us for a birthday present. It was a super nice day of somewhat different diving and for us "bugs galore." You missed another good one if you stayed home — or ever worse at work!!

Wild Wave/Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.

 B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment
- in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.

 C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full
- is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.

 D)

 If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
