Our only dive on the ENCORE in 1993 is to NINE FATHOM REEF, SAN CLEMENTE ISLAND and CASTLE ROCK. We will leave in the early AM from 22nd Street and run overnight to make our first dive at NINE FATHOM REEF. This is one of the most spectacular dives in the southern area, with purple coral, game, sea lions and other sea life to view and maybe PHOTOGRAPH or VIDEO.

This is The Sea Divers' fourth dive on the ENCORE -- the largest boat in the Southern California fleet. ENCORE is 80 feet long, 25 feet wide, has 12 staterooms, ladies dressing room, 45 seat galley, walk-in freezer, large sundeck and color TV/VCR. We are limiting the trip to 32 divers which is extremely comfortable on a boat of this size.

Following the NINE FATHOM REEF dive, we will cruise south and east along SAN CLEMENTE, with the backside as first choice and the frontside as our alternate. The diving will provide a variety of underwater topography in what is typically excellent visibility. Water temperatures are rising, making for comfortable conditions. Game takers will not be disappointed, with FISH, SCALLOPS and ABALONE available. We plan to make our final dive back on the west end at CASTLE ROCK which will provide a relatively shallow dive on the beautiful reef structures around the rock. Those who just like to dive and enjoy the scenery can't pick a better dive. This trip is suitable for all skill levels. There will be typical Sea Diver goodies added to this charter.

Those who pay in full will be preassigned to their favorite bunk on a FIRST COME FIRST SERVED basis. For sign up call Kathi (McNally) at (310) 370-1657. Boarding will begin at 7:00 PM on Friday, 4 June, for a 1:00 AM departure on the 5th. NICE, NICE TRIP!!


Our second two-day dive of 1993 is a great southern outer island cruise and dive to the very best spots. This Friday/ Saturday affair has all the makings of a really outstanding trip! The rebuilt CHARISMA is berthed at 22nd Street in San Pedro and is 78 feet long, 25 feet wide, has 7 staterooms, a 36-seat galley, freezer, large sun deck, and color TV/VCR. BEGG ROCK is a group of pinnacles which rise about 15 feet above water and then plunge in the most spectacular fashion, to over 100', with rolling ledges from 30' to 60'. The rock is located about 7 miles north of SAN NICOLAS Island, and is noted for its huge plate-sized SCALLOPS on the deeper ledges (easy to limit out at the one-day limit of 10). PHOTOphiles and VIDEO buffs will be well served. Relative beginners should note that BEGG ROCK is fully exposed to the ocean, but on good days may be dived by all skill levels after appropriate pre- dive consultation with The Sea Divers' dive masters and a properly planned dive.

SAN NICOLAS, the outer most of the southern islands, is noted for its relative remoteness and typically large size game. Ocean temperatures are high (50-60 degrees F) like last year, making diving very pleasant. Divers should also have no problem reaching the limit on ABALONE (pinks, greens and/or reds). Large FISH, such as Calico Bass, Sheephead, etc., can be found in the kelp beds and reefs. You won't come home empty handed! We will overnight at SAN NICOLAS, probably at Dutch Harbor, with full dinner, and a modicum of wine, for those interested, socialize with good friends and enjoy a typically great evening, just relaxing. The following day we will either head for BEGG ROCK for our second attempt, or cruise to SANTA BARBARA Island, which is the smallest, prettiest island, and has a little of everything. The spectacular underwater arches, walls, reefs, sea lions, and other sea life are great for PHOTOGRAPHY and VIDEO and visibility is usually exceptional. You should be able to complete your second day ABALONE limit at SANTA BARBARA—mostly pinks, greens and a smattering of whites and reds. Again, large FISH surround the area, including the occasional black sea bass (these are for viewing only!!!).

In our established two-day tradition, goodies, prizes and/or awards will be featured during this trip. Sign up early to make sure you have a spot on this charter. Bunks will be preassigned on a FIRST PAID basis. Call Kathi (McNally) at (310) 370-1657 for sign up. Boarding begins at 7:00 PM on Thursday, 22 July, and everyone should be on board by 11:00 PM. TWO "As" AND A "B"

PEACE left the dock at Ventura Marina at 2:00 AM prompt early Friday morning for our two-day charter to the northern Channel Islands, hopefully to include San Miguel Passage, our planned destination. Exiting the harbor entrance we encountered BIG swells, which were enhanced by the wonderful design of the entrance and the depth of the water making for an extremely sporty couple of minutes. But calm did not set in — au contraire!! We roughed it all the way to the southeast lee of Santa Cruz — the last hour or so on ONE engine!! We anchored about 6:00 AM at Albert Anchorage for a respite to confirm the fix on the engine and to rest. After an hour or so we decided to open up the gate and make our first dive as conditions further west had deterioriated even more! Tucked into the cove, divers had calm water with no current, depths to 50 feet and nice visibility at about 35 feet. The clouds of mackerel (we think!) probably numbering in the millions were the highlight of the dive.



For our second dive we sneaked around the point (now on two full engines) into the next cove west - Coches Prietos Anchorage. Obviously conditions were much the same as the first dive with somewhat larger fish --mostly kelp bass and sheephead. We decided on a run WEST to scope out the severity of the winds and ocean. Bowen Point (about mid-point of the south side) was all she wrote. BIG stuff!! We looped around and headed back east, finally anchoring about 4 miles EAST of our first two dives. Depth was to 50 feet, calm, no current, slightly less visibility at 25-30 feet and more kelp. There were a few reasonable size scallops in the area and my one and only pink abalone (7-1/2"!).

For dive number four we cruised further EAST to just west of Sandstone Point. At the beginning of the dive it was calm, a slight current, and 40 feet of 25-30 foot visibility water. At the end of the dive white caps and a noticeably increased current caused "rescues" of about eight divers. None were in serious trouble, but surface conditions were quite difficult. Retreat WEST!! Back to Albert Anchorage to get out of the strange winds. Dive five (daylight) and dive six (night) were made right back where we started early in the AM! TRUTH anchored adjacent to us.

With day one over, we began the evening's festivities and dining delights. The steak dinner was up to the PEACE high standards — as were all meals. Cheri Mc and Isabelle did an outstanding job. The club awarded certificates to Peter L for 700 dives and Wil L for 600. We also awarded Skipper of the Year (1992) to Bill Mc / Mike R. The hot tub got a workout as did the VCR!

Saturday dawned just beautiful – as did Friday – but the wind was obviously still up judging by the white caps on the horizon. Again we made a strong run at the WEST end of Santa Cruz in the hope that we could maybe tiptoe around the corner into the Santa Cruz Channel. About two miles from Gull Island a summons to the bridge brought a quick consensus that there was almost as much white out there as there was blue!!! We looped around one more time to head back EAST.


We found quiet and a modicum of security tucked behind the rock formation at Willows Anchorage. TRUTH was on the other side. We made two dives in calm, 40 foot deep water with 25-30 foot visibility. The reefs yielded a day's take of medium-size scallops for the determined, plus a few fish of various types, then back further EAST one more time!

The third dive of the second day was at Valley Anchorage after running all the way EAST to Sandstone Point, hitting major wind and the looping back WEST. This was a difficult dive in calm, 15-20 foot visibility, 50 feet deep water with a strong current! Most did not dive long. After some discussion, it was decided to motor slowly EAST, cut north along the eastern end of Santa Cruz, have lunch, sunbathe, pack gear, etc., and then brace ourselves for the anticipated rough crossing from San Pedro Point on the northeast tip back to Ventura. We began our run at about 1:00 PM.

Initially it was rough, but as we crossed closer to Ventura, the ocean slowly calmed down, leaving us with the excitement of big swells in the entrace to the marina — we made it surfing the last 50 yards or so!! We tied up at the dock at just before 4:00 PM.

Boobies we had — the only worthwhile award. In contention were: Gus V for losing his King Harbor Clean-up T-shirt overboard and for jumping in sans weight belt; Bill (owner/skipper) for destroying our box-wine boxes — the wine was in the bag cooling; Nick (deck hand) for anchoring the stern with the chain looping just to the bottom and the anchor swinging half way up one of the loops; Isabelle (galley girl) for dropping the galley microphone into a pan of thick, gooey turkey gravy. Isabelle won!! — a large yellow Jose Cuervo Tequilla pinata. Great stuff, guys!!!






SEA DIVER AWARD CERTIFICATES

We have a new 8-1/2" x 11" award certificate available to be used for presentations to club members (and others) for outstanding achievements.

Typically we will award a certificate for a club member's 500th, 1000th, 1500th, etc., dive, when that dive is completed on a club outing. Awards will also be made for the President's Annual selections, boobies, heroes, donations, etc.

You may suggest an award for yourself or another club member depending on circumstances. FOR 1993 ONLY we will present an award certificate for divers who reach 600, 700 or 750 (only one!) dives on one of our dives THIS year.

So far award certificates have been given for the 1991 and 1992 President's Annual Awards; John Delaney for his 1000th dive; Peter Landecker for 700; Wil Lemley for 600; and David Serena and Allen Parker, both for 500.



JUST SIX YEARS AGO . . .

Our June boat dive was a two-day on the WILD WAVE to Begg Rock/ San Nic/ Santa Barbara at \$130. There was no beach dive planned. We had just revised our boat dive policy to allow a small number of bubble watchers to sign up for our boats. We had a photography competition running (we should start that again!!) and Hindman was pushing the LACC Advanced Diver Program (excellent program!) and a basic SCUBA class. Dues were \$10 (annual) for TRWites and \$20 for non-TRWites courtesy of the Employee Association!

JADE COVE CAMPOUT

2-5 JULY 1993

Jade Cove is 40 miles south of Monterey and 30 miles north of San Simeon. It is noted for chunks of nephrite jade at and below the water line. It is real jade!! Once you find a nice size specimen, jade fever usually takes over. And, you can have three days to find some!

DIRECTIONS: It is approximately 5-6 hours driving time from the South Bay area to Jade Cove. Go north on 101 thru Santa Barbara to San Luis Obispo. Exit at the Hwy. 1 offramp for Morro Bay and head north to San Simeon. Twenty-nine miles past San Simeon you will pass through a very small town called Gorda. Look for the Plaskett Creek campground sign on the east side of Hwy. 1 about 2-1/2 to 3 miles north of Gorda.

WHAT TO DO: The diving at Jade Cove is noted for its beauty in addition to its gems. There are large lingcod and other rock fish for the gamesman. Usually there is a thick kelp bed to cope with and conditions can be quite variable. The hike to the beach is through 100 yards of meadowland and down a 150' cliff along a steep switch-back dirt trail. For those not wanting to cope with the cliff, several miles north is Willow Creek where you can drive down to the beach. It is a sandy beach entry with rocky patches out further that are great for the photographer and the browser. There are other things to do besides diving — hiking, photography, bird watching, volleyball, catching up on R&R, and meeting fellow club members.

Monterey/Pt. Lobos is a one hour drive north on Hwy. 1. Reservations to dive Pt. Lobos must be made no earlier than one month in advance. If you are interested, contact Cathy Gale.

CAMPSITE & FEES: The club has reserved group campsite #3 on the southwest end of the campground. It can accommodate 50 people and 8 parking slots. The campsite is designed for tents and there are tables, fire pits, vault toilets and drinking water. No showers are available in this area. Camping fee is \$15.00 per person and checks should be made payable to The Sea Divers.

WHAT TO BRING: Camping gear, cooking utensils, warm clothing for the evening, full dive gear, firewood, hiking boots, abalone iron (to move gravel in your search for jade), small dive light, and as many tanks as you would like to dive with. The nearest air station is 55 miles south in Cayucos at Bill's Sporting Goods. There are small stores in Gorda or 1 mile north of the campground for ice, gas, etc. Word of warning: gas is expensive in Gorda.

BOUILLABAISSE TIME ALREADY?

13 JUNE - VETERAN'S PARK, REDONDO BEACH

DIVING - REFRESHER COURSE - BOUILLABAISSE COOKOUT/POTLUCK

We will dive just south of the pier at Redondo adjacent to Veteran's Park. For those unfamiliar with the dive site, it offers an easy sandy beach entry. The surf is typically small due to the Redondo Canyon at this location. Following a sloping sand bottom, the diver encounters the old Redondo Pier pilings about 50 feet out. They stand above the sand bottom reaching 10 feet and more toward the surface. Their long submersion leaves them covered with red corinactus and hollowed out havens for crabs. Continuing further, the pilings end in about 80 feet of water over the edge of the Redondo Canyon. Anyone requiring a short "refresher" in diving should contact Ken Sizemore for appropriate arrangements. Park in the Redondo Beach Municipal parking lot on the south side of Veteran's Park at 25 cents an hour (so bring quarters!!!).

Grande Master Chef Parker will be stirring up a warm and filling pot of bouillabaisse that is guaranteed to satisfy the most discriminating diver. "Le Chef" asks all who plan to partake of this tasty concoction to BRING SEAFOOD, CAUGHT OR BOUGHT, TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE POT. Crusty bread will be provided, but bring your own beverages, other accompaniments, and a potluck if you are not into bouillabaisse!

Wild Wave - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the mini-traffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment B) in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D)

If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
