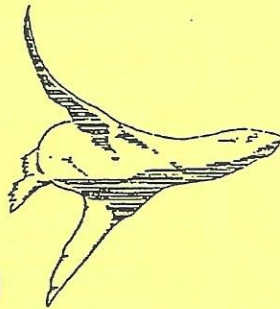


THE SEA DIVERS

FROM AN EXECUTIVE FRUSTRATION . . .

We on the Executive Committee work hard to make our club successful and to provide what we believe is a diving program that appeals at least to most of our members. Case in point -- the July two-day on CHARISMA to Begg Rock, San Nicolas and Santa Barbara at an excellent all-inclusive price of \$175. Popular last year AND the year before, remember the two dives at Begg Rock and the white shark encounter, etc. Nicest dive boat around; great crew with a charismatic (!) skipper, John H.; and scheduled for late July with anticipated great weather. So what happens? As is typical, sign-up starts slow, leading to "commitments" and/or "strong interest" from about 27 divers. We're a go! Right? Wrong!! Promised payments do not arrive although the phone calls confirming continue. To cut a long, agonizing story short, we finished up with 13 paid sign-ups, 2 divemasters and a couple of flaky promises to "pay on the boat." We have no choice but to replan the dive as a single day to Begg Rock/San Nicolas at \$90 all inclusive. Result: we lost some divers and gained some, finishing up with enough people to barely avoid a financial disaster. Two of the most asked questions are: (1) If no money, why are people considered 'signed up'? Answer: People typically pay as late as possible and right or wrong, that's life. (2) If the boat's not near full, why not cancel before the club owes money? Answer: We'd cancel EVERY dive!!

The nature of the Executive Committee is that we'll keep plugging away; but if the CHARISMA event recurs, we're dead ducks, and we are not alone. Other clubs, boats and stores are experiencing similar problems. Bottom line: sign-up if you are serious; pay as soon as possible (credit cards are now accepted) and just be reasonable and fair. We continue to need your support of our events.

The planned itinerary for this our second "Peace" two-day of 1994 will take us out to San Miguel Island - as always, weather permitting.

We will cruise directly to San Miguel passed Santa Cruz; the Santa Cruz Channel; Santa Rosa and cross the San Miguel Passage onto the south side of San Miguel diving Crook Point Wyckoff Ledge and out to Adams Cove and Point Bennett - similar to our highly successful May dive. We then plan to circle back around the east side of the island for one or more dives before overnighing.

Weather permitting the second day, we would hope to tackle one of the major pinnacles (Wilson or Richardson). Failing that, we will dive the lee side of Prince Island. We will then begin the run back to the mainland stopping for dives along the north side of either Santa Rosa (Talcott Shoals) or Santa Cruz.

This two-day will provide excellent opportunities for game (fish, abalone, scallops) and all kinds of photogenic sea life. Overall there will be dives for all skill levels - although the pinnacles are strong intermediate to advanced dives in all but near perfect conditions.



Needless to say, the "Peace" is a great boat just be on - diving or not!!! Note that large pods of blue and humpback whales have been sighted off Santa Rosa and San Miguel. Call Kathi (McNally) at (310) 370-1657 for early sign-up and bunk assignment as you pay in full!!!

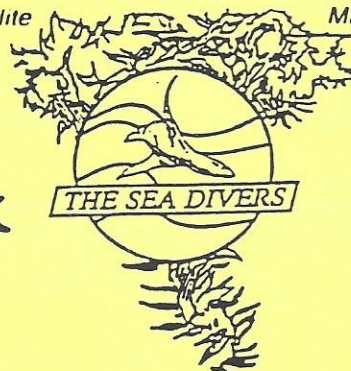

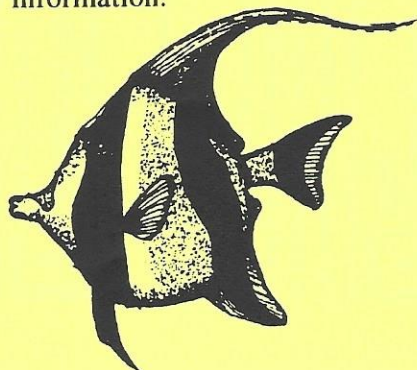
THE AUGUST BEACH DIVE

Our beach dive for August is set for "Shaw's Cove" in Laguna Beach on the 27th. The cove is well protected from surges and wave action, which helps keep the surf low and the visibility good for the coastal beaches. Those who wish to sharpen their entry and exit skills, can choose from either the rocky reef, sandy beach or shore rocks to impress all with their poise and skill.

High tide typically allows good visibility and a chance to visit "Shaw's Burrow", a small tunnel in the reef that is too shallow to swim through when the tide is low. The less aggressive crowd can walk or lay on the soft sandy beach. There are easily accessible tide pools to the left and a reef with cracks and tide pool areas on the right. Water to the east has shallow reefs extending out about 100 yards that are covered with blade kelp and eelgrass. To the west is a large reef with the highlight of the area called "Monroe's Crevice". To locate "Monro's Crevice", swim seaward along the edge of the rocks past "Shaw's Burrow". This main channel begins as a 15 foot cut into the reef and narrows to a tunnel filled with Garibaldi and other marine life. Eventually it branches off into smaller channels and tunnels, where you'll find octopus, nudibranchs, sponges and a variety of anemones. One branch ends with a oblong opening called "The Portal", swimming through this window puts you half way along a large north/south chasm that joins the main channel or exits seaward through the reef, depending on which way you turn. If you decide not to explore the "Crevice", you can continue past the opening and find a reef with gorgonians, anenomes and garibaldi.

To arrive at "Shaw's Cove" you would take the 405 freeway south past Irvine to Hwy 133 south, this will dead end into PCH in Laguna. Turn right on PCH and watch for a dive shop on the left, at the dive shop turn left onto Fairview. The walkway to the beach is at the end of this street, parking is on the surrounding side streets and can be hard to find. Come join us for a great time.

DIVE COMPUTER SAFETY TIPS



- All divers relying on dive computers to plan dives and indicate or determine decompression status must have their own unit.
- On any given dive, both divers in the buddy pair must follow the most conservative dive computer.
- If the dive computer fails at any time during the dive, the dive must be terminated, and appropriate surfacing procedures should be initiated immediately.
- Divers should not dive for 24 hours before activating a dive computer to use it to control their diving.
- Once a dive computer is in use, it must not be switched off until it indicates complete outgassing has occurred or 24 hours have elapsed (whichever comes first), or if no more dives are planned over the next few days.
- When using a dive computer, non-emergent ascents are to be at the rate(s) specified for the table, or by the make and model of dive computer being used.
- Ascent rates shall not exceed 60 fsw per minute.
- A stop in the 10- to 30-fsw zone for three to five minutes is recommended on every dive.
- Repetitive and multilevel diving procedures should start the dive, or the series of dives, at the maximum planned depth, followed by subsequent dives of shallower exposures.
- Multiple deep dives should be avoided.
- Breathing 100 percent oxygen above water is preferred to in-water air procedures for omitted decompression.
- It is recommended that divers' attention be directed to emphasis on the ancillary factors to decompression risk such as: fitness to dive, adequate rest, hydration, body weight, age, and especially rate of ascent — which should not be more than 60 feet per minute.
- Divers are encouraged to learn and remember the signs and symptoms of decompression illness and report them promptly. This enables them to receive effective treatment as rapidly as possible and helps prevent residual injury later on.
- Breathing oxygen on the surface whenever possible via a demand regulator mask system (to ensure the highest percentage of oxygen to the patient) is recommended while awaiting treatment if decompression illness is suspected. The use of 100 percent oxygen in the water while awaiting treatment is *not* recommended.





Ten Ways a Diver Can Protect the Aquatic Realm

1 Dive carefully in fragile aquatic ecosystems, such as coral reefs.

Although, at first, they may look like rocks or plants, many aquatic organisms are fragile creatures that can be killed by the bump of a tank, knee or camera, a swipe of a fin or even the touch of a hand. It is also important to know that some aquatic organisms, such as corals, are extremely slow-growing. By breaking off even a small piece, you may be destroying decades of growth. By being careful, you can prevent devastating and long-lasting damage to magnificent dive sites.

2 Be aware of your body and equipment placement when diving.

Much damage to the environment is done unknowingly. Keep your gauges and alternate air sources secured so that they don't drag over the reef or bottom. By controlling your buoyancy and taking care not to touch coral or other fragile environments with your body, diving equipment or camera, you will have done your part in preventing injury to aquatic life.

3 Keep your diving skills sharp with continuing education.

If you haven't dived in a while, your skills (particularly buoyancy control) may need sharpening. Before heading to the reefs, seek

bottom time with a divemaster or instructor in a pool or other environment that won't be damaged by a few bumps and scrapes. Better yet, take a diving continuing education course such as PADI Scuba Review, the PADI Advanced Open Water Diver course or a PADI Specialty Diver course.

4 Consider your impact on aquatic life through your interactions.

As every diver soon learns, very few forms of aquatic life pose a threat to us. In fact, some creatures even seem friendly and curious about our presence. As we become bolder and more curious ourselves, we may even feel compelled to touch, handle, feed and even hitch rides on certain aquatic life. However, our actions may cause stress to the animal, interrupt feeding and mating behavior, introduce food items that are not healthy for the species or even provoke aggressive behavior in normally nonaggressive species.

5 Understand and respect underwater life.

Through adaptation to an aquatic environment, underwater life often differs greatly in appearance from life we are used to seeing on land. Many creatures only appear to look like plants or inanimate objects. Using them as "toys" or food for other animals can leave a trail of destruction that can disrupt a

local ecosystem and rob other divers of the pleasure of observing or photographing these creatures. Consider enrolling in a PADI Underwater Naturalist course.

6 Resist the urge to collect souvenirs.

Dive sites that are heavily visited can be depleted of their resources in a short time. Collecting specimens, coral and shells in these areas can strip their fascination and beauty. If you want to return from your dives with trophies to show friends and family, you may want to consider underwater photography.

7 If you hunt and/or gather game, obey all fish and game laws.

You may be among the group of divers who get pleasure from taking food from the aquatic realm. If you engage in this activity, it is vital that you obtain proper licensing and become familiar with all local fish and game rules. Local laws are designed to ensure the reproduction and survival of these animals. Only take creatures that you will consume. Never kill anything for the sake of killing. Respect the rights of other divers who are not hunting. Avoid spearfishing in areas that other divers are using for sightseeing and underwater photography. As an underwater hunter, understand your effect on the environment.

8 Report environmental disturbances or destruction of your dive sites.

As a diver, you are in a unique position to monitor the health of local waterways, lakes and coastal areas. If you observe an unusual depletion of aquatic life, a rash of injuries to aquatic animals, or notice strange substances or objects in the water, report them to local authorities, such as the local office of NOAA or similar organization in your country.

9 Be a role model for other divers in diving and non-diving interaction with the environment.

As a diver, you realize that when someone tosses a plastic wrapper or other debris overboard, it is not out of sight, out of mind. You see the results of such neglect. Set a good example in your own interactions with the environment, and other divers and nondivers will follow suit.

10 Get involved in local environmental activities and issues.

You may feel you can't save the world, but you can have a great impact on the corner of the planet in which you live and dive. There are plenty of opportunities to show your support of a clean aquatic environment, including local beach clean-ups and attending public hearings on matters that impact local coastal areas and water resources. Know all sides of the aquatic environmental legislative issues and make your opinions known at the ballot box.



DIVE BOAT NEWS



"WILD WAVE" ET AL

As you will see on our calendar we have chartered "Atlantis" and "Bottom Scratcher" to replace two of our three "Wild Wave" dives in October/November 1994. While both boats are slightly smaller and slower than the "Wild Wave" (and unfortunately slightly higher priced!) both came presently highly recommended. We will probably chose one organization or the other for our 1995 "Wild Wave" replacement. There is no further news on the eventual fate of "Wild Wave". Rumor has it that about \$25,000 would get her back in service somewhere.

"ATLANTIS" (14 OCTOBER 1994)

"Atlantis" is docked at Cabrillo Marina (the ex "Wild Wave" dock) is 65 feet long 20 feet wide and has bunks for up to 30 divers. Amenities include 2 hot water showers; sun deck; color TV/VCR; full galley and a safety inflatable. Jim Caslin is the owner/skipper.

"BOTTOM SCRATCHER" (19 NOVEMBER 1994)

"Bottom Scratcher" and sister boat "Sand Dollar" are docked at Queen's Wharf in Long Beach.

"Bottom Scratcher" is 63 feet long 21 feet wide and has bunks for up to 23 divers. Amenities include 3 hot water showers; color TV/VCR; full galley and a safety inflatable. Also included/available are steel 72 tanks and weight belts. Bill Johnston is the owner and (sometimes) skipper.

CREDIT CARD PAYMENT

As mentioned in the Exec. write-up we can now accept credit cards for payments. There is however a slight cost to the club so it helps the treasury some if you continue to pay by check or cash - always in advance, right? Remember we pre-assign bunks on a first paid basis as encouragement to sign-up and pay in full early.

"WILD WAVE" REMEMBERED

Dear Dive Club President:

Anyone familiar with the decline of the abalone resource within southern California will find it as no surprise that the Department of Fish and Game has a Draft Environmental Document in process. This document will place a two year moratorium on the commercial and recreational take of white, green and pink abalone. Everywhere within California's ocean waters, wherever these species exist, along the coastline as well as off all the local coastal islands, a prohibition is being considered.

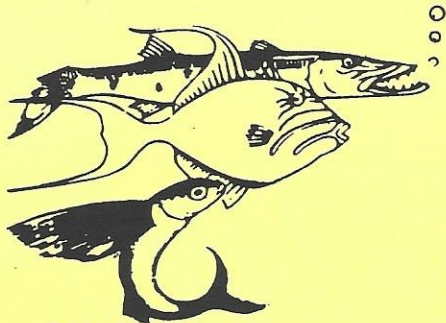
This project's objectives are to provide adequate resource protection to ensure the continued existence of these species. Presently black abalone, a species which has been decimated by withering foot syndrome, is on the prohibited harvest list. WS has been known to crossover to other populations impacting those species and further exacerbating the problem.

Scoping sessions, similiar to those held with the establishment of Prop 132 scientific sanctuaries, will be conducted for this closure. Presently the Department is requesting the public's views to include in the environmental document, including potential actions, alternatives, mitigation, monitoring and effects to be analyzed. Comments should go Sharon Shiba, Department of Fish and Game 330 Golden Shore Dr #50, Long Beach, Ca. 90802. Soon a schedule listing dates and locations of scoping sessions will be published. The designated cities for these sessions are Santa Barbara, Long Beach and San Diego. Copies of the draft document will be available to anyone requesting it directly from the Department.

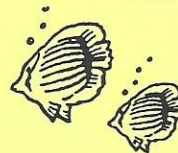

Atlantis - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the mini-traffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
