

The Physiology of Heat Loss

Exposing yourself to the aquatic environment can have obvious and subtle chilling effects.

o one likes to be cold. Since the development of sport diving in the United States, we have tried to develop equipment and techniques to reduce the effects of being cold while scuba diving. As divers, we've all developed our own philosophies about being cold — but do all of us realize its consequences?

A number of years ago, I was briefly assigned to the Oceano-graphic Unit at the U.S. Navy base in Panama City, Fla. While there, I met Wally Jenkins, one of diving's true pioneers. During one reminiscent excursion into yesteryear, he showed me some black-and-white photos of himself and his buddy — hanging in the water some distance apart — decompressing after deep dives in Wakulla Springs, where the water temperature averages 72°F/22°C.

Wally explained that since they had no wetsuits at the time, they intentionally remained apart to avoid disturbing each other's "warm shell" — the layer of warm water that forms around us when we remain motionless in the water. Close inspection of the photos revealed that the decompressing divers were covered with goose bumps.

· Today, as it was then, being a little cold is considered by many to be a routine part of the diving experience, and the dangers are generally ignored. But cold may be a serious limiting factor in recreational scuba diving from both a physiological and performance standpoint.

Here's how: When diving, heat loss can occur even in relatively warm waters. Prolonged exposure to 80°F/26°C water—nearly 20°F/8°F below body temperature—without some form of thermal protection, can create progressive hypothermia. This slow cooling has been used to describe the performance decrements (decreases) that occur with cooling in divers.

The symptoms associated with progressive hypothermia are numerous. Muscle stiffness, numbness, and weakness all reduce the diver's ability to respond effectively in an emergency. This reduction in physical ability, and a decrease in reasoning and decision-making abilities, may place divers at risk during cold-water exposures.

Additionally, the combination of cold water and exercise stress might have been a factor in some cardiac deaths while diving. Cold exposure can produce a number of cardiac responses such as increased heart rate, blood pressure and respiration, and the negative impact on cardiac efficiency may be greater in divers who are not well-conditioned physically. Finally, immersion in extremely cold water can cause a reflex that induces a coronary spasm which in turn can lead to a sudden loss of consciousness, drowning and

A side effect of hypothermia works in conjunction with the

weightlessness of scuba diving. These two factors in combination can cause a reduction of blood flow to the extremities, called peripheral vasoconstriction. With a subsequent increase in blood pooling in the internal organs, more blood circulates through the kidneys, causing diuresis (increased urine output). The result is a great loss in vital body fluids, which may make the heart more prone to disturbances in rhythm.

Hypothermia results in a reduction in blood volume, which may alter gas absorption and elimination in the body. This can increase the possibility of bubble formation and resulting decompression sickness. DCS risk may also result from vasoconstriction, or the narrowing of blood vessels, which can limit the body's ability to eliminate inert gases from tissue compartments. However, controlled human studies are lacking that statistically validate the influence of cold in increasing the risk of decompression illness. But, reports from both commercial and military diving communities suggest that cold may be an independent factor in placing the diver at an increased risk to develop decompression sickness.

Exposing yourself to the environment may, be the dream of every diving naturalist. The problems in so doing, however, may far outweigh the benefits if you don't have the proper exposure protection.


Does everyone need a safe second or only certain people?

Nine club members made their way via Aero California to La Concha Beach Resort in La Paz, Baja California, Mexico for three full days of diving in the Sea of Cortez. Several in the group were there in May 1993 and we had returned primarily to dive El Bajo (the Seamount) in hopes of diving with schooling hammerheads.

Last year the Fernando Aguilar diving operation picked us up at the La Concha beach, but they've grown big time and are developing a marina near the La Paz ferry/harbor and have several larger boats that could not come into the beach anyway! A van or large ex-school bus picked us up at La Concha and took us to the marina which actually saved a little time in the boat. Another noticeable change is that 70-80% of the divers are Japanese couples resplendent in every bright and or wild color imaginable!!!? - they also dive as a group following the Aguilar dive master - looked like a exploding rainbow underwater!

We succeeded! The visibility was poor due to plankton blooms and jelly fish (millions) and there was typically a high current flowing but El Bajo yielded the hammerheads - big, awe inspiring beauties coming unexpectedly out of the gloom from almost any direction. In our several dives in the 80-100 feet region, we found the best technique in the current was to carefully hold onto a pinnacle overlooking one of the many canyons and just wait for one or more to come by! Awesome. Each El Bajo dive (2 Thursday; 2 Friday; 1 Saturday) were followed by shallower dives. The Thursday follow-up dive was a small rocky islet on the west side of Isla Cerralvo. Friday's follow-up dive was a spectacular non-dive as we were fortunate enough to skin-dive in mid-channel with a pod of 40-50 pilot whales - perhaps a once in a lifetime opportunity. Watching them approach and then sound was just a beautiful sight. We got right adjacent to them two out of four attempts, with video to prove it!!!

We made two follow-up dives Saturday one on the wreck of the "Salvatierra" and one on a small shallow coral laden reef. Great, great, days of diving. La Concha is much the same as is the city of La Paz - we made The Bismark, Oasis, El Morro and Posada de Humperdink restaurants - all good and consumed a "fair" amount of cervesa and local concoctions! Needless to say the trip went by fast and I know I wish I was still there. We are seriously considering a trip next year with 6-8 divers so we can be on our "own" small fast boat as we were on "Fantasma" the last day. The much larger "Realidad" - Thursday and Friday's boat is 1 - 1 1/2 hours slower to El Bazo making for a longer though more comfortable day of diving. We'll set the dates and take the first 8 serious (with money!) sign-ups and go. I'll be there.

Atlantis - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the mini-traffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.

 D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.


If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
