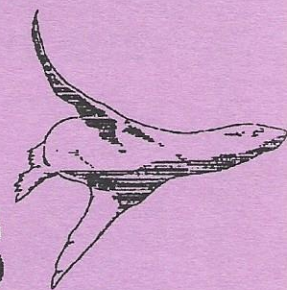

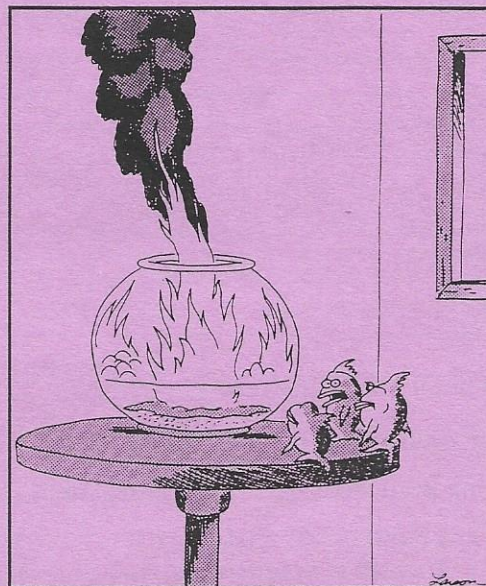

The planned itinerary for this our first two-day of 1995 will take us out to San Miguel Island -- as always, weather permitting. Our first dive spot will be on the east side of Santa Rosa Island in a good scallop and/or abalone area. We will loop around either the north or south side of Santa Rosa depending on ocean conditions picking off one or more dives either on the northwest tip (fish and scallops) or the southwest tip (fish and abalone).

We then hope to cross the San Miguel Passage onto the south side of San Miguel diving Crook Point, Wychoff Ledge, and Tyler Bight. We will then circle back around the east side of the island for one or more dives before overnighing in Cuyler Harbor.

Weather permitting we would hope to tackle Wilson Rock or, failing that, we will probably dive the lee side of Prince Island. Then we'll begin the run back to the mainland stopping for dives along the north side of Santa Rosa possible at Little Wilsons.

This two-day will provide excellent opportunities for game (fish, abalone, scallops) and all kinds of photogenic sea life. Overall there will be dives for all skill levels -- although, Wilson Rock and other pinnacles are considered to be for strong intermediate to advanced dives in all but near perfect conditions.

Needless to say the *Peace* is a great boat just to be on -- diving or not!! Call Kathy (Kalohi) at (310) 719-1816 for early sign-up and bunk assignment as you pay in full!! We have a minimum of half the boat and as of this writing we have a short wait list. Other spots may be available depending on the other half boat sign-ups.

Our second dive on the *Encore* in 1995 is to the back side of San Clemente Island and Castle Rock. We will leave in the early AM from 22nd Street and run overnight to make our first dive at Nine Fathom Reef. This is one of the most spectacular dives in the southern area, with purple coral, game, sea lions, and other sea life to view and maybe photograph or video.

Following the Nine Fathom Reef dive, we will cruise south and east along San Clemente, with the backside as first choice and the frontside as our alternate. The diving will provide a variety of underwater topography in what is typically excellent visibility. Water temperatures are rising, making for comfortable conditions. Game takers will not be disappointed, with fish, scallops, and abalone available. We plan to make our final dive back on the west end at Castle Rock which will provide a relatively shallow dive on the beautiful reef structures around the rock. Those who just like to dive and enjoy the scenery can't pick a better dive. This trip is suitable for all skill levels.

Sign-up and pay in full to be preassigned your favorite bunk. Call Kathy (Kalohi) at (310) 719-1816 to sign-up this popular dive. Nice big boat to a great island. DON'T MISS OUT!!

The run over to Ship Rock was uncomfortable as we were running parallel to the 8 to 10 foot swells, providing for lots of rock and roll. Once anchored east of Ship Rock the comfort level was increased and things settled down.

Visibility was great at over 50 feet and the slight current was a non-problem. Surprisingly, the water temperature was 60°F. Depths were to the sandy bottom at 110-120 feet. Some scallops (deep) and a few nice fish were available for those so inclined. The second dive was on Eagle Reef. Visibility dropped a tad but other than that conditions were much the same. Despite John H's announcement that the water temperature was 68°F it remained at 60°F!! We looped all the way round the reef noting several legal lobster - as we had at Ship Rock - they have to know the season is closed!!! Again scallops were available and a few abs including one deep-shelled white!!

The wind had picked up again limiting choice of dive spots so we opted for Ismuth Reef just north and west of Bird Rock. Nice diving with flat areas, walls, and mini-canyons to explore. Two dives were made in the one spot. Conditions were much the same as the previous dives. Departure for 22nd Street was delayed about 20 minutes due to a severely stuck anchor. Once on our way the run back was fairly comfortable with eight or so spending time in the sun on the "veranda". The wind was obviously picking up again! Sunday was the windy day so for once we beat the worst of it but only just in time. I suspect they didn't go out on Sunday.

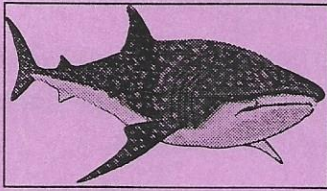

Finally, last but not least they were thrown into the luggage rack. Mine smelled like fish and I hadn't even been diving yet.

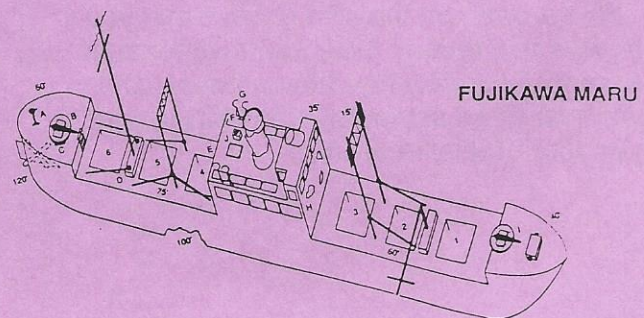

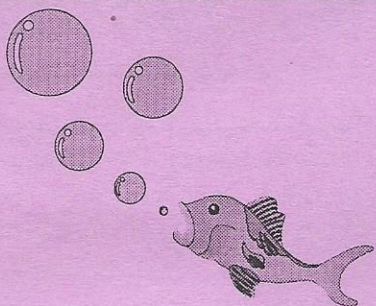

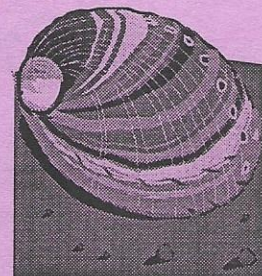

Ab Stamp to Help Fish and Game



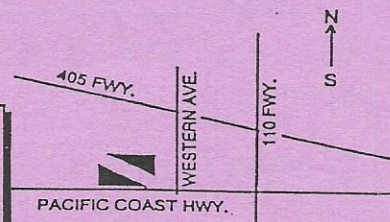
The California Fish and game Department presently had no means of obtaining statistics on the number of abalone taken by sport divers. Some people within the commercial abalone industry seem to think that sport divers deplete the resource by constant overhunting. Their reasoning often goes like this: "If there are 300,000 sport divers in California, and each of them takes 7 abs, the resource will be completely gone in a few years."

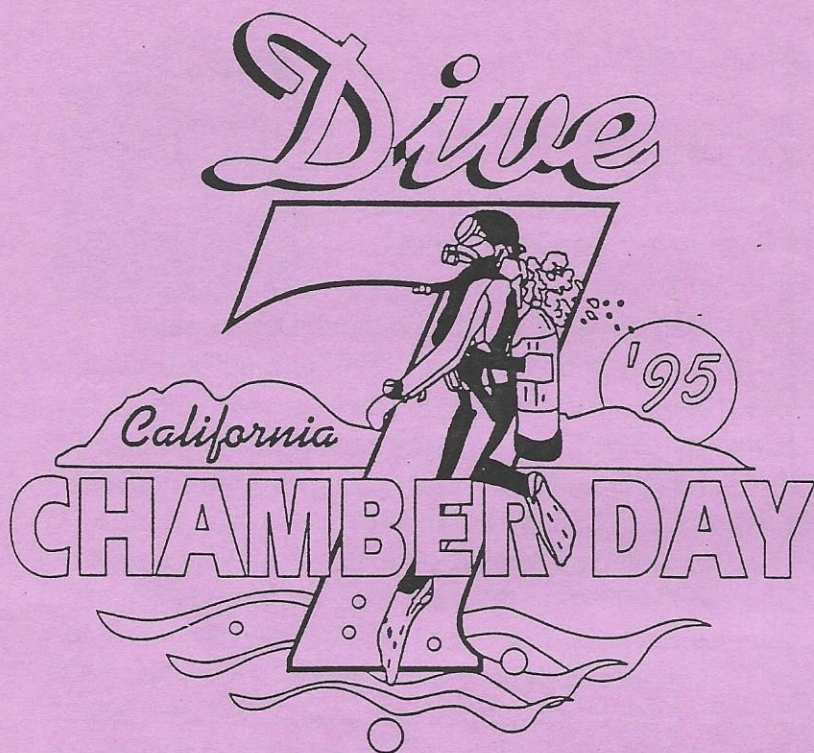
All divers know speciaous reasoning when they hear it but there is no question that there needs to be a means of providing some feedback to the Department.

Current thinking is that a proposed Ab stamp for fishing licenses will help solve the problem and gain some much needed funds for the program as well. Not all divers hunt abalone and those that do whould be willing to pay a small fee for a stamp very much like duck hunters now do. Also like duck hunters, ab hunters will be asked to report their take during the season.

This solution will help the Department of Fish and Game handle the objections and fears of the commerical industry.

Wednesday, May 3, has been selected as the date for Chamber Day '95, the seventh annual fund raiser to benefit both the hyperbaric chamber operating at the Isthmus on Catalina Island and the uninsured diver fund for the Pleasant Valley Hyperbaric Chamber.

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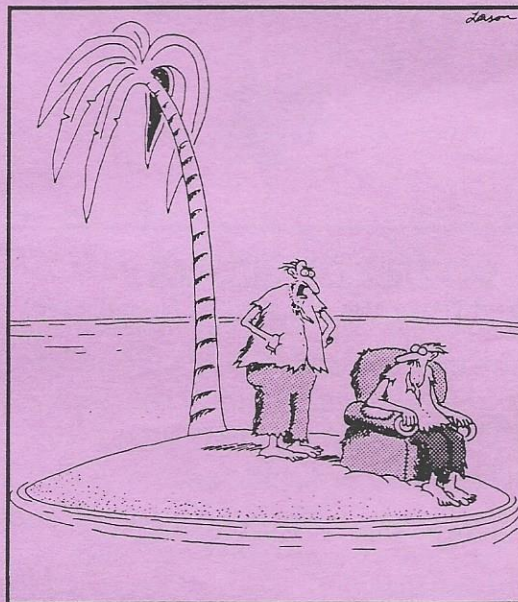

Atlantis - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the mini-traffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive, go to the left onto Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only club members of The Sea Divers and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from single day boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks.
