
FROM THE EXECUTIVE RETROSPECTIVE...



Pinnacles Galore

This trip report is a combination of separate reports written by Peter Landecker and Michael Borden on the September 12 and 13th two-day aboard *Peace*. The trip was exceptionally calm with some overcast and sun later in the days.

The first dive was at Richardson Rock with plate size scallops on the spectacular walls. A five foot wolf eel was observed by several divers. Not totally satisfied, the second dive was at Wilson Rock. There was a strong current and some surge. Again some scallops and large red abalone including a ten inch, five pound beauty collected by Peter L. (a.k.a. "10-inch Peter") at 75 feet. Visibility at both pinnacles was about 40 feet. Temperature a "balmy" 53°F. Sea lions were abundant and Peter L. was able to touch one friendly young female. (Editor's note: What does that have to do with the sea lion's?)

Dives 3, 4, and 5 were in various locations around Castle Rock. Again red abalone were abundant. Limits all around!! The overnight was in Cuyler Harbor which provides an expanse of sandy bottom for the halibut hunters. None taken, none found. Dinner on board was the usual gourmet affair for which *Peace* is noted. This time it was tri-tip with all the trimmings.

The second day, the first dive in calm seas was at Crook Point. A fish spot only, murky and cold. Dive two was between Crook Point and Wychoff Ledge known as The Bluffs. More red abalone and fish. Dive three was on the other side of Crook Point completing the abalone take for the day.

All in all an outstanding trip making the two major pinnacles and Castle Rock. Great stuff in the environs of San Miguel.

Just Ten Years Ago...



TWISTED HISTORY...

The armoured of combat *Bismarck*, was the most powerful coaster in the world. The same that did be dispatched to the sea from German's naval forces in 1940.



LA PAZ - HURRICANE ISMAEL AND ALL

Twelve Sea Divers signed up for our September trip back to La Paz in anticipation of typical hot weather and great diving. Read on!

We arrived in La Paz from LAX in late evening of 12 September 1995. Wednesday the 13th was a planned pool-side kick back day (or day of choice). High thunderheads, lightening, thunder, and torrential rain set in about 3:00 PM, reducing the remainder of the day to hiding under the poolside bar roof and/or palapas.

Thursday (14th) was our first dive day and although the effects of hurricane Ismael were already with us, we went out in a small 35 footer *Tio Ed*. The first dive was at the wreck of the *Salvatierra* in about 60 feet of water (Dive Spot #6 - See map). The wind was coming up quickly and the seas were far from friendly. It was raining horizontal!! The dive was great with 40-50 foot visibility and 82°F water. Once back on the surface, it was obvious that the world was coming apart on us. *Tio Ed* was already rolling at least 45° each way, no place to be on the edge of a hurricane. Divers back, we began a hasty retreat to Lobos Rock (Dive Spot #5) hoping that the small lee side would offer sufficient protection from the elements. Only just! The dive was up to 40 feet deep and the swim around the rock took a leisurely 30 minutes. Visibility was OK at 20-25 feet. The rain was continuous and horizontal on the surface and enough was enough...we made our early run back to La Paz. Everything was soaked with a mixture of ocean and rain. Nice, real nice stuff. Ismael decided to hang around with torrential rains continuing into Friday (15th).

Friday was to have been our second dive day. With the exception of Peter L. we all decided to "blow it off", electing to do beach, pool, and bar instead. By the afternoon, skies were clearing and hot was again setting in. Saturday (16th) dawned calm and hot and we boarded the 43 foot long *Realidad* for the 2-1/2 hour run to El Bajo (Dive Spot #10) in search of the schooling hammerhead sharks. We anchored just south and east of the north of three pinnacles. Most of the Sea Divers elected to buddy dive rather than cluster dive with Enrique, the diversater - a desire embraced by most of the Japanese contingent. We made two dives to 80-100 feet in calm, 50 plus feet visibility water with a perceptible current at depth. No hammerheads for us, however Enrique found them well north and east of the pinnacles we had tried. OK, time to swallow the old pride - tomorrow we do El Bajo again and cluster dive!!! Our run back brought us a bonus of one or two pods of orcas who seemed to enjoy the somewhat aggressive approaches we made. Great stuff!

Sunday (17th) we had arranged to take the 31 foot very fast *Casi Casi* with mostly just Sea Divers. Enrique was again our diversater. We loaded up and *Casi Casi* left for El Bajo. As we rounded the first point the skipper throttled up to warp speed and BOOM we threw one of four props, (two Volvo-Penta turbo charged inboard/outboards with contra-rotating props). No big deal we've still got three props, right - nooo problems!! Wrong, *Casi Casi* would not run right due to the imbalance between the engines, so we were reduced to 10 knots or so. Not exactly per plan. We rendezvoused with *Realidad* and switched boats making our arrival at El Bajo very late, albeit having spent some time successfully free swimming with a pod of pilot whales.

Pride swallowed, we cluster dived with Enrique. This was a bad news good news process. The bad news, the current was way up causing difficulties on the surface current line and more difficulties assembling divers at depth. Air was "burnt off" in significant quantities just getting organized. The good news, we did finally see schooling hammerheads, no doubt, no second guesses, they were there! On the second dive we unclustered and most of us were fortunate to see additional hammerheads doing their thing, however visibility was deteriorating from 50 feet to less than 40 feet. Our third dive, snorkel and/or swim was at Los Islotes, the sea lion colony (Dive Spot #1) which is always entertaining. Visibility was varied from 30 feet to 50 feet. Water was a warm 85°F. After a long but gratifying day we arrived back at the dock after sunset.

So we had a little of everything during our stay. For the \$687.45 diver price it was one hell of a deal! Sure glad I went and I didn't miss this one even with the weather situation. Ismael tried but only dented the plans!

DIVE SPOTS

1) LOS ISLOTES, Sea Lions in the wild. 27 mi. from La Paz, 1 to 2 hours boat ride one way. Year round good diving spot, well proctected from prevailing wind at all times.

2) EL BAJITO, 30-60 ft deep, reef with cracks and crevices excellent drift diving. 27 mi.from La Paz, unprotected from winds. Good year round.

3) WHALE ISLAND, 30-100 ft, caves, crevices, rocky reefs, black coral forest. Protected from winds. Good year round.

4) CANDLE STICK, 50 ft. deep, well protected, reef and big boulders, excellent 2nd. dive spot. Good year round.

5) LOBOS ROCK, (light house), good for night diving and in summer months excellent 2nd. dive spot. 20 min. boat ride.

As above 2-3 hr. boat ride.

6) SALVATIERRA WRECK, 60 ft. max. depth, 300 ft. hull sank in 1976. Unprotected spot, possible 1-3 kt current with tide changes. Always good.

7) SWANNE ROCK, reef in 30 ft. which caused the sinking of Salvatierra ferry boat.

8) OLD SEA LIONS COLONY, no sea lions but rocks, boulders and crevices. 20-150 ft reef protected from SW winds, good in summer months.

9) PAILEBOAT, similar as above but shallower.

10) EL BAJO, sea mounts in 60-140 ft. of water. Sharks and pelagics year round. Excellent spot for advanced divers, with possible 1-3 kt current. 2-3 hours. boat ride one way, 36 mi. N of La Paz. Unprotected and subjet of rough surge in winter months. 6 pax minimun per boat. Spot subject to weather permission.


11) LA REINA, (light house), N of Cerralvo island, subject to weather permission, with possible current and surge.
50-90 ft deep, " Mazatlan " wreck home of

big fish and pelagics.

12) LA REINITA, N Cerralvo is. reef protruding out of water to 150 ft., vith crevices and big fish. Only summer time.

13) SOUTH CERRALVO IS., good dive year round. 45 mi. S of La Paz, most of the area is unprotected. o.k. when La Paz dive is impossible due to very strong NE winds in winter time.

14) BOATS GRAVEYARD., 10 min. boat ride 50-70 ft. deep, no current. Good night dive and protected.

For years, the vast majority of Californians mistakenly believed that the garibaldi was the state fish. They were incorrect in their assumption because the official state fish was actually some obscure type of trout. I say obscure due to the fact that few people, if anyone, had actually seen this animal.

The reason that no one ever sees this trout is that they supposedly live in streams in the farthest reaches of the state where no one but the most die hard of trout fisherman goes. George Hughes was the club President, Don Andree the Vice-President, Martin Kendziorek Treasurer and Elaine Kerns Secretary. The club membership was close to 200 with General Meetings being held at the perennial Lococo's. The upcoming boat dive was on the Westerly to Catalina - no price quoted - and the "beach dive" was a three day La Jolla weekend campout with a boat dive on the Bottom Scratcher, beach dives in La Jolla Canyon, La Jolla Cove, and at Shell Beach, tours of Scripp's Aquarium and the Navy's Deep Diving System, all topped off with a BBQ. Not bad!!

The Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber was just one year old, the *Westerly* was four years old and the club was celebrating it's 10th Anniversary. The Department of Fish and Game (DFG) had just proposed a five year moratorium on abalone between Palos Verdes Point and Dana Point. It's still in force!!! Club dues were \$4 for TRW employees and \$5 for non-employees.

Atlantis - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the minitraffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive, go to the left onto Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only club members of The Sea Divers and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from single day boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks
