Our second two-day dive of 1998 is a great southern outer island cruise and dive to the very best spots. This Friday/Saturday affair has been the making of really outstanding trips in past years, especially in 1996 and 1997 where we made Begg Rock on both days.

Begg Rock is a group of pinnacles which rise about 15 feet above the water and then plunge in the most spectacular fashion to over 100 feet with rolling ledges from 30 feet to 60 feet. The rock is located about 7 miles north of San Nicolas Island, and is noted for its huge plate-sized scallops on the deeper ledges (easy to limit out at the one-day limit of 10). Photophiles and video buffs will be well served. Relative beginners should note that Begg Rock is fully exposed to the ocean, but on good days may be dived by all skill levels after appropriate predive consultation with the divemaster and a properly planned dive, with your buddy.

San Nicolas, the outer most of the southern four islands, is noted for its relative remoteness and typically large size game. Ocean temperatures will be up above 60°F, making diving pleasant. Large fish, such as Calico Bass, Sheephead, etc., can be found in the kelp beds and reefs. Depending on weather, diver desires etc. we will stay at San Nicolas or make a run to Santa Barbara Island, which is the smallest prettiest island and has a little of everything. The spectacular underwater arches, walls, reefs, sea lions, and other sea life are great for photography and video and visibility is usually exceptional. Again large fish surround the area, including the occasional black sea bass (these are for viewing only!!!).

If we overnight at San Nicolas we will either head back to Begg Rock or head to Santa Barbara Island. If we overnight at Santa Barbara Island we'll make a run to Farnsworth Banks. In all cases weather permitting!

Farnsworth Banks is on the backside of Catalina about 1.3 miles off Ben Western Point. The Banks are about 100 yards by 600 yards, with the shallowest pinnacles at 55 to 75 feet. The spectacular walls descend to well over 100 feet. Farnsworth is famous for its protected unique coral which is the deep purple color contrasting with other colonies of coral, such as at Santa Barbara which tend to be pink, red, and orange. Some of the colonies of coral are over 15 inches in diameter, and the whole visual effect adds immeasurably to the beauty of Farnsworth, both to the eye and the lens of your camera, still photo and/or video. Large fish, which are not protected, inhabit the area so you spear folks may collect a nice bounty.




This will be the club's first wreck dive since 1991. For this single day charter, we plan to dive the *Olympic*, which is a relatively deep dive, then proceed to the *Avalon* for a somewhat shallower dive. Subsequent to the *Avalon* we will dive a couple of spots off Palos Verdes in yet shallower water.

We will leave the dock at 7:00 AM sharp and head out to the *Olympic* some 3-1/2 miles out from the San Pedro Light at L.A. Harbor. The *Olympic* was built in Belfast, Ireland, and launched in 1877 as the *Star of France*. She was an iron hulled, square-rigged bark of 1,644 tons, 258 feet long and 38 feet wide. Some 63 years later she was rammed amid ships by the *Sakito Maru* about 7:00 AM on 4 September 1940, and sank within minutes with 17 of 24 on board surviving. The *Olympic* lies essentially on the starboard side in about 100 feet of water. The highest part of the bow is about 70 feet below the surface with the bowsprit extending out over the sandy bottom. The midship section is approximately parallel to the sand and is in relatively poor shape, however, mast stubs are visible, as is the deck pump and its large spoked wheels. Also, if you spend a little time on the port side, you can still see the remains of the huge "V", cut by the *Sakito Maru*. The top of the stern is about 80 feet below the surface and this section is between 40 and 50 feet long. The whole wreck is covered with strawberry anemones. It is a fascinating dive.

We will then head off towards Palos Verdes Point and the wreck of the *Avalon* some 15 miles from the *Olympic*. The *Avalon* was built in Cleveland, Ohio, and launched in 1891 as the *S.S. Virginia*. She was a steel hulled, triple deck, twin screw passenger steam ship of 1,985 tons, 265 feet long, and 38 feet wide. Some 69 years later, while being used in salvage attempts of the *S.S. Dominator*, she sank during the night of 18 July 1960, after breaking away from her moorings in a violent storm. There was no loss of life. The *Avalon* rests in about 70 feet of water, between and parallel to the rocky ridges, with the major wreck sections partially on their port side. The relatively intact bow section is some 90 feet from the rest of the wreck, which begins with a debris field that includes steel deck plates and hull ribs. The debris field slowly rises and is connected to the very recognizable stern section. Some sections of the wreck are covered with a variety of sea life.

Wreck diving over, we will begin to work our way around the Palos Verdes Peninsula towards San Pedro, picking two of the best reefs for some relatively shallow diving. Surprisingly to some, marine life flourishes in the area with excellent prospects for spearing several popular and good size varieties of fish, including calico bass. Video and photo enthusiasts will not be at all disappointed with the underwater opportunities in the coves, on the reefs and in the kelp forests. We anticipate a very interesting day out with an unusual selection of dives, that should provide for more than the average charter. END OF MR. NIÑO?

To put it bluntly diving so far this year has sucked!! Our February dive was canceled due to damage to the Great Escape, in March we fell back to San Clemente in lieu of San Nicolas, April at Catalina was horrible, the May two day on the Peace, despite Eric's boat heroics was a bust and the recent June dive to San Clemente fell well short of great diving - all courtesy of Mr. Niño!!

Early June was not bad weather wise, a little breezy at times but we expected good weather for the San Clemente dive. It was bumpy on the overnight run and early AM showed Great Escape pointed at the front side not Nine Fathom Reef. We eventually tucked in just south of the Navy restricted Area near the Blockhouse. It was reasonably calm with no current. Kathy D. and I dropped off the starboard side (away from the island) and drifted down to 90 feet or so in poor visibility before we realized we had missed the reef and wall. A 90 degree turn revealed the wall. Overall visibility on the reef was about 25-30 feet, 60°F temperature and no fish of any consequence. A 'Ho Hum' kind of dive. Some on board must have liked it as they were down for 50 minutes!!

We moved about 5 miles north and west, skirting the Restricted Area and anchored in about 50 feet of much clearer water. Nice spot with heavy kelp, leaning underwater from a medium current at the surface. The surface current was to be a factor the remainder of the day making it difficult for our two spear hungry skin divers. Below there were "millions" of small fish of all varieties typical at San Clemente. Good sign for the future, but little good for spearing. Water temperature was 59°F and visibility in the 50-60 feet range.

Next choice was the outer edge of Northwest Harbor. Ripping current with poor visibility say 10-15 feet. Larger fish were available but they were tough to see!! A short move south failed to provide a good spot as we immediately dragged anchor in the current.

Spot five was back real close to spot two with little change in conditions. Some divers soldiered on others, including us, had quit and were looking for sun, which was elusive for awhile.

Tim B. tried to find good spots but Niño leftovers prevailed. There was also little entertainment in the booby stakes. However, a day out diving, cruising, and sunning beats a LOT of other options. Let's hope Mr. Niño is DEAD!! On to the July two day to Begg Rock.



BAJA QUEST:

World Class Diving in La Paz, Mexico

A few days of diving at some of the most spectacular dive sites in the northern hemisphere, scuba divers who visit La Paz, Mexico often have to reflect for a moment and ask themselves an important question: "Who are the friendlier inhabitants of this city--the friendly colony of California sea lions at Los Islotes or


the La Paz locals who will go out of their way to help a lost, information-seeking tourist who attempts to speak a little bit of Spanish?"

La Paz is the commercial and the governmental capital of the state of Baja California Sur. Its name means "peace," and a large contemporary sculpture, known as the Dove of Peace Monument, acts as the gateway to the city. The white sculpture, which is a combination of a dove's wing and a whale's tail, bears the translated inscription: "And if you want peace, I offer it to you in the sunny peace of my bay." The city spreads out from the curving shore of the largest bay along Baja's eastern coastline, the Bahía de la Paz. *

Despite its commercial bustle, La Paz is a laid-back city of approximately 186,000 residents who carry themselves with pride and respect. While tourism is willingly accommodated, a thoroughly Mexican atmosphere prevails. On Sunday evenings throngs of couples and families can be seen taking a leisurely stroll along the palm-fringed malecón, (the waterside Paseo Alvaro Obregón) against the backdrop of a spectacular sunset.*

For the serious diver on a vacation destination, the friendly, casual, and helpful atmosphere also prevails at Baja Quest, a dive operation located by La Paz's waterfront.

"I book many of my clients through Baja Quest," explains Ernie Arellano, owner of Scuba Travel Ventures, a travel service he



owns based in San Diego, California. "The backgrounds of the individuals are so professionally diverse, that divers get an experience that is unique," explains Arellano.

Owner Adria Rocio Lozano, a native of La Paz, has a master's degree in Oceanography in Marine Resource Development and Protection. Her Japanese partner, and husband, Jen Ito, both formed Baja Quest in April of 1996. They both met in La Paz in 1991, got married in Tokyo, and lived there for three years working as divemasters until they returned to La Paz in 1994. Mr. Ito's international connections are the main reason you will run into many Japanese divers on one of Baja Quest's five boats, which are used for camping, sea kayaking, live-aboard cruises, and whale watching in addition to scuba diving. Since 1996 Baja Quest has been heavily involved in ecotourism, a theory of economics used in developing countries and the source of Ms. Lozano's master's thesis.

Divemaster Juan Aviles Oard, another native of La Paz, has approximately seven years of diving experience. His familiarity with the region goes back to his childhood when his parents took him fishing and camping on the islands (islas) of Cerralvo, Espititu Santo, and Reina. Juan can navigate around these dive sites blindfolded. He also has a tendency to dive for clams (almejas) between his dive master duties with gear and game bag in hand. Ask him to treat you to a tasty uncooked morsel and he will gladly oblige.

Boat captain Jose Cervantes is a proud man in his early sixties. With eyes as sharp as a hawk, he can spot a manta jumping out of the water approximately 700 yards away and tell the difference between a fin whale, a California grey whale, and a blue whale when they are miles

away. Make an effort to speak to him in your broken Spanish and he will proudly tell you about his eight years of experience as an abalone diver off Isla Natividad (on the pacific side next to Isla Cedros) during the 1960's. Continue with your questions and he will tell you that his son serves in the military in Chiapas and that recent uprisings, which have gained national attention, are the result of troubles with the Guatemalan chiefs and not the

Mexicans. Cook Juan Abiles not only catches but also makes a very tasty pescado Veracruz with vegetable and tomato sauce.

Baja Quest lists ten dive sites on its web site at bajaquest.com.mx. The most well-known dive site is the El Bajo Seamount with its frequent sights of hammerhead sharks (pez martillos) and other pelagic species such as giant Pacific mantas, marlins, whalesharks, sailfish, and schools of jacks. Divemaster Juan can find these species before they are even aware that divers have sited them. It takes about three and one-half hours by boat from downtown La Paz to reach this advanced dive site. It is often exposed to strong currents in the late fall and winter when rough seas can occur because of its exposed location.

Hundreds of friendly California sea lions can be found at Los Islotes, which is considered to be an easy-to-moderate dive spot located 27 miles north from Isla Espiritu Santo. Sea lions at Los Isoltes have the distinction of seeing more tourists from every part of the globe than residents of Paris, France. One can only guess that because of this constant attention, sea lion pups have developed a flair for tugging at your fins and snorkel. For the truly brave diver, they will be bold enough to allow you to put your hand in their mouth chewing on your fingers like a playful puppy.

La Reinita (Little Queen) is an islet and reef located on the western central part of Isla Carralvo with crevices, boulders, and caves that provide food and shelter for snapper, groupers, green jacks, Mexican barracuda and an occasional marlin or dorado. Other dive sites include Salvatierra, (the site of a ferryboat that was sunk in 1975 lying on the bottom of the Sal Lorenzo Canal), Isla Ballena, Punta Lobos, and La Reina.

Optimal visibility of 100-200 feet occurs during the summer months of July and August when water temperatures in the high 70's and 80's kill off plankton. Be sure to bring plenty of sunscreen, a hat, and cool clothing, as afternoon temperatures in this dry, desert climate can reach into the 100's. Locals claim that September, October, and early November are the best times to visit La Paz. Those months are at the end of the Mexican tourist season and water temperatures and visibility are still ideal.

On your decompression day off, Jack Velez Sportfishing Charters (located in the lobby of the Los Arcos Hotel) offers boats for the avid fisherman ranging from pangas to fully equipped large cabin cruisers. Sailfish, yellowfin tuna, dorado, roosterfish, yellowtail, wahoo, and marlin make La Paz a world-class sportsman's fishing destination.

A city tour of La Paz by English speaking guide, Kathryn Romero Garcia, is also available for \$15.00 for a day trip. The tour begins daily at 10:00 a.m. and runs through La Paz's main streets, the Cathedral of our Lady of La Paz, the public market in the center of town on Avenida Revolución de 1910 at Degollado, the anthropology museum, and the baseball stadium. Also included in this six hour tour is a visit to the pottery workshop (Centro de Arte Regional) south of the downtown area and to Artesanía Cuauhtémoc (The Weaver), who makes and sells hand-woven cotton and woolen items such as rugs, tablecloths, and placemats. The tour concludes with a two-hour stay at Playa Delocote, a beautiful deserted beach that boasts a world-class restaurant.

A popular eatery is La Paz-Lapa, on Paseo Alvaro Obregón at León, part of the Carlos Anderson chain. The noise level is deafening, but the fish and beef are tasty and the atmosphere convivial.


The airport is located 11 miles southwest of the city off Mex. 1. Aero California and Aeroméxico have daily flights from Los Angeles and Phoenix to La Paz. Cab fare from the Los Arcos hotel to the airport runs about \$12.00. Cab drivers charge more (\$20.00) for transportation from the airport to the city. The airport, however, is the last place you will want to visit on your La Paz vacation as it signifies that your vacation is over and that you will be leaving a city, which has some of the friendliest people in the world.

Great Escape - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive, go to the left onto Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only club members of The Sea Divers and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from single day boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
