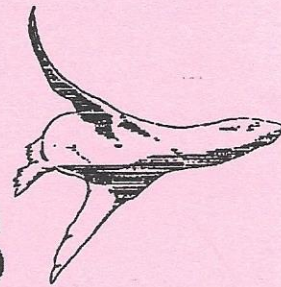

FROM THE EXECUTIVE MID-YEAR NOTES...

On 10 June 1999 we held our mid-year Executive Meeting at Roberto Al Mare's. In all nine Executive's were in attendance. The agenda is shown to the left. In summary, we are in excellent shape. We have over 125 members with a noticeably active core, we are filling our all inclusive, limited load (no longer split charter) boats, and we have a consistent balance in the treasury. Some changes to our policies were agreed to as follows:

1. Only new members who pay full annual dues will be allowed their first single day dive at half-price (i.e. they can't combine prorated dues with a discount dive).
2. Free divers pay half-price plus \$17 on a single day dive.
3. There are no changes to our Nitrox policy and we will not permit Trimix diving.
4. The limited load policy allows for twenty-eight divers, two non-divers on *Peace* and four non-divers on *Great Escape*.

These changes are effective 1 July 1999.

Our second two-day dive of 1999 is a great southern outer island cruise and dive to the very best spots. This Friday/Saturday affair has been the making of really outstanding trips in past years.

Begg Rock is a group of pinnacles which rise about 15 feet above the water and then plunge in the most spectacular fashion to over 100 feet with rolling ledges from 30 feet to 60 feet. The rock is located about 7 miles north of San Nicolas Island, and is noted for its huge plate-sized scallops on the deeper ledges (easy to limit out at the one-day limit of 10). Photophiles and video buffs will be well served. Relative beginners should note that Begg Rock is fully exposed to the ocean, but on good days may be dived by all skill levels after appropriate pre-dive consultation with the divemaster and a properly planned dive, with your buddy.

San Nicolas, the outer most of the southern four islands, is noted for its relative remoteness and typically large size fish. Ocean temperatures should be up around 60°F, making diving pleasant. Large fish, such as Calico Bass, Sheephead, etc., can be found in the kelp beds and reefs. We will overnight at San Nicolas, probably in Dutch Harbor, with full dinner, socialize with good friends, and enjoy a typically great evening just relaxing. The following day we will either head to Begg Rock for our second attempt, or cruise to Santa Barbara Island, which is the smallest prettiest island and has a little of everything. The spectacular underwater arches, walls, reefs, sea lions, and other sea life are great for photography and video and visibility is usually exceptional. Again large fish surround the area, including the occasional black sea bass (these are for viewing only!!!).

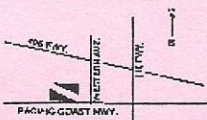
JULY GENERAL MEETING: PETER LANDECKER AND FRENCH POLYNESIA

NICE DAY OUT

With the weather forecasting being essentially wrong most of the year we were pleasantly surprised to anchor over Nine Fathom Reef about 6:00 AM, on Saturday 5 June, per plan! The morning overcast was with us and the swells were manageable. Nine Fathom is always a nice dive but this early it was dark down there. There was no current, depths to 80 feet, visibility over 40 feet and 52°/53°F temperature.

A visual of the backside said OK but surgy and probably dirty. We headed east looking for a wall just east of Castle Rock. Didn't find the wall I was thinking of but the second dive was a nice spot. Conditions were much the same as at Nine Fathom with less swell action and a lot more kelp. The third spot was near the wreck of the *Koka* at the southeast tip of Northwest Harbor. Nice spot but we have dived it many times and the sun was out.....! Conditions were calm, increasing current, especially outside the wall, depths to 100 feet, 40 to 50 feet visibility and 54°F water. Rumor had it that there was another wreck 1000 yards west of the *Koka*. We tried, no luck. Depths to 40 feet or so, calm no current. More kelp!!

All in all it was a nice day of diving and with bright sun from about 10:30 on, a nice warm day. Beat most other things I would have been doing otherwise. The boat food was excellent, especially the pork at lunch time – in fact we asked Steve for his “secret”. We will try it at home although we aren't professionals!! The only real booby of the day was a Navy exercise in which they blew something up, set fire to it and created a huge black cloud which partially obscured the sun for 30 to 40 minutes!! So much for clean air. The run back was uneventful and about 30 minutes shorter than announced. Good!!

LOS ANGELES COUNTY ADVANCED DIVER PROGRAM (ADP)

Recognizing the need to provide a comprehensive continuing education and training program for the recreational SCUBA diver in the Southern California area, the Los Angeles County Underwater Instructors Association, in conjunction with the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation, established the Advanced Diver Program in 1964.

The program objective is to provide participants with an opportunity to individually improve their diving and expand their diving knowledge, with an emphasis on the Southern California diving environment.

Combining lectures with pool and ocean labs, the candidates are provided with a comprehensive learning environment. The main objective of the training is to increase the students' safety and enjoyment in our local ocean surroundings.

The ADP program is conducted annually from mid-July to mid-September with participants receiving over 100 hours of training including a minimum of 14 open water dives.

OUTSTANDINGLY DIFFERENT

The 26 June dive was our club's first venture into oil rig diving. The day began overcast (what's new?) and diving began on *Eureka* which is in 700 feet of ocean (i.e. no bottom!). *Great Escape* was to be a "live boat" for the day, the technique being to come close to the oil rig drop off about one third of the divers on board, then regroup for the next one third and so on. Surfacing divers then grouped up to be picked up by *Great Escape* (i.e. no tender). Worked real well.

Eureka is covered in a myriad of sea life. In particular, huge mussels and large to huge scallops, the deeper the larger. Some of the support legs and cross-bracings are, on a smaller scale, as beautiful as any of the best reefs around. For both dives on *Eureka*, the swells were minimal, a major plus for rig diving, there was no significant current, another major plus, visibility to 60 feet and just over 60°F temperature. The only negative, brighter sun would have helped the whole effect. Scallops galore!!

We moved to the double rig, *Ellen/Elly* and made two dives there. Conditions were much the same with a slight increase in swells and reduced visibility of 45 to 50 feet. Not quite as spectacular as *Eureka* but still an outstanding diving. The sun finally came out during the first dive on this rig.

Both series of dives were also great for video and photography, especially *Eureka*. We arrived back at 22nd Street early at about 4:00 PM after an unusual but outstanding day of diving. We do plan to dive rigs again, as everyone on board was delighted with the whole day. Three boobies of note: Kathy D. had her shorts on inside out, Kathleen T. did a spectacular head first entry into the galley, and one divemaster (hint: Terry) had to be dragged (a.k.a. 'rescued') to the boat with a bag full of scallops he wouldn't relinquish!! The boat was well run under skipper Dave and the food was good to excellent.

Great Escape - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive, go to the left onto Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only club members of The Sea Divers and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from single day boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.

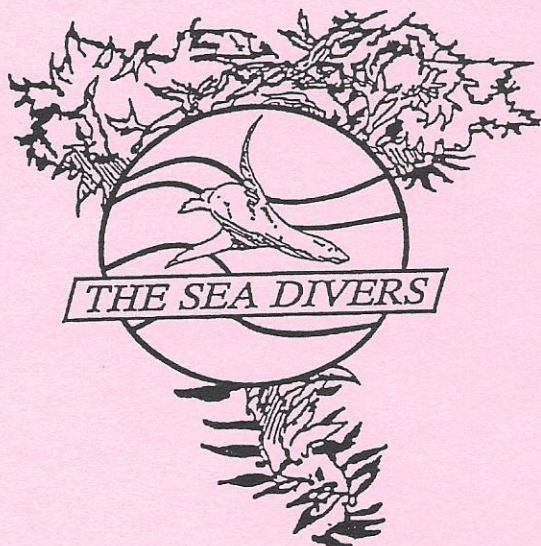
